### LOCAL LAWYERS GET INDIAN FEES

#### FEDERAL COURT ORDERS CLERK TO PAY \$1500

Charles H. Carter and R. J. Slater Are Reimbursed for Services in Ten-Year Case.

Claiming that the department of Indian affairs is so unalterably opposed to all attorneys that it will not allow Indians to pay them fees for representing them, R. J. Slater appeared before Judge Bean in the United States circuit court Saturday and asked that the clerk of the courts be directed to pay him \$500 and C. H. Carter \$1000 for representing Tolslap, a Umatilla Indian, in a land case, says the Journal. Judge Bean allowed the fees and signed an order that the money be paid the two attorneys.

The case in which Carter and Slater appeared was begun 10 years ago and involved an allotment on the Umatilla reservation. It was entitled "Yakima Joe against the United States and others." Yakima Joe claimed to be the husband of a deceased allottee. Tolslap claimed to be her father and was made a defendant in Yakima Joe's suit to secure the land. Carter saw Tolslap and made a contract for a contingent fee of \$1000 if he won the suit for

him. Later Slater was called into the case and secured a second contract from Tolslap, guaranteeing him \$500 if he won the suit. Neither attorney was to receive any money if the case was lost. It was decided in favor of Tolslap June 14, 1910.

"Whether justly or not," Mr. Slater told Judge Bean today, "the department will not pay any money belonging to Indians to attorneys for the Indians. The land we saved for our client is easily worth \$12,000. Over \$3000 in rentals is now in the hands of the disbursing agent and the case has been in court ten years."

United States Attorney John McCourt said the government had no objection to the amount of the fees asked and admitted that it is quite impossible for an attorney to secure the payment of fees through the Indian department. Judge Bean signed the order allowing the payment of the \$1500 from the rental fund on the land in question which has been in the hands of the disbursing agent since the commencement of the suit.

#### SPOKANE WOMAN CLAIMS ALFALFA ROOT DISCOVERY

Alfalfa roots, white and tender, will take the place of early asparagus if Louise F. Weiland, an irrigation rancher in the Spokane valley, is successful with her plans for marketing the newest table vegetable in the western country. Miss Weiland, who came from Pennsylvania, last spring broached the enterprise to members of the Spokane chamber of commerce and several have promised to assist in establishing a small factory.

The discovery that alfalfa root is nourishing to man as it is to live stock was made by Miss Weiland several months ago, but the proper method of preparing it was not ascertained until a few days ago, when the young woman, after poring for hours in a huge tome on cookery, decided to try recipes for cooking asparagus. The first dish was sampled by a neighbor's hired man, who, ignorant of what he was eating, called for a second dish. Other neighbors ate of the root and pronounced it satisfying to the palate as well as highly nourishing. They say the flavor is similar to asparagus.

#### PRISONER STEPS FROM JAIL INTO WEALTH
