

"Half starved, half frozen men have been hung by their thumbs to a limb of a tree in punishment for trival of-


fenses," according to the charges. Describing the "starvation punishment," one of the guards in a signed statement says:

"I was ordered to take a gang to the laudry. We passed a tub of bones thrown out as refuse. Each prisoner grabbed a bone like a hungry dog and sucked it. They were really starving."
