BLUESTEM WHEAT GOES UP ONE CENT

CALIFORNIA DEMAND CAUSE SLIGHT INCREASE

Call Is Limited—Hay Continues Weak—New High Mark for Hogs—Chickens Are Too High.

World's Wheat Market. Portland—Cash club, 77@79c; bluestem, 80@82c. Buenos Ayres—Wheat weak. Melbourne—Wheat slow. Calcutta—Wheat steady. Liverpool—Wheat 1-2 to 5-8d lower.

Antwerp—Wheat 5-8c higher. Paris—Wheat 3-8 to 3-4c higher. Berlin—Wheat 1-8c lower. Chicago—Holiday, no market. Minneapolis—May 94 7-8c; July, 96c. St. Louis—May, 89 1-2 bid; July, 85 5-8c. Kansas City—May, 84 7-8c. July, 82 5-8c. Winnipeg—May, 91c bid; July, 92 3-8c.

Bluestem Higher. Bluestem wheat is being bid a cent higher at 82c a bushel tidewater track delivery while one interest is offering as high as 79c for club same delivery. Both of these quotations are for California account.

A demand for bluestem has again sprung up in the south and as no supplies could possibly be secured at the former nominal quotation, bids were raised a cent in an effort to take on a few small lots.

While there is a demand for our wheat from California the total wants of the south are limited just now and therefore only a restricted movement may be expected.

Oats market is steady at \$27@27.50 per ton for No. 1 white here, but the movement is small.

There is nothing doing in the barley trade. Eastern shipments have practically ceased owing to the shortage at interior Oregon-Washington points. While feed barley is firm here, the demand is purely local.

Flour market remains quiet both for patent and export. No change is announced in prices today.

Hay continues weak for all except timothy of fancy quality. Prices are nominally the same.

A portion of a load of hogs that were light and of excellent quality sold this afternoon at \$9 in the stockyards, thereby breaking all recent records.

The cow that was sold by Kidwell & Caswell yesterday to J. C. Lonergan at \$5 was resold to a local meat company at \$6.75. Instead of being held for the show, it will be dressed.

The entire livestock situation is firm in the North Portland yards. The arrivals today were scattered and most of them were late. The first hogs available for the market since last Friday came forward today and tops were sold at the former high mark, \$8.75. This compares with the best price at Omaha at \$6.95, which means \$8.95 to land the Nebraska stuff at Pacific northwest packing centers.

The cattle market is indicating considerable strength for good quality and recent sales of steers have been made as high as \$6.80, a number of lots went at the high mark.

No sheep were showing in the yards this morning, but the market is firm at the advance of 10c quoted yesterday.

Chickens Too High. Chickens from the ice house are again going into consumption as the result of the recent high record reached by live poultry along Front street.

While the receipts of chickens are scarcely any better than last week, buyers did not take hold of the arrivals nearly so eagerly as they did a few days ago. The ordinary coops that are now coming forward are not worth more than 21c a pound while hens would naturally be worth a fraction more than this.

No hens are coming forward for the reason that farmers are loath to part with their laying stock in the midst of the egg season. For that reason the quotation on hens may be considered nominal.

Importations of frozen chickens from the east are again starting and this is likely to have a lowering effect upon the live poultry situation here. While the trade does not take kindly to the ice house goods, still, the great height that prices have reached in the fresh poultry market, has stimulated to a great extent the consumptive demand for frozen supplies.

Movement in the egg market is much better and for that reason most handlers are asking 21c for fresh candled stock. This is for local market. Eastern fresh eggs, while generally considered of the same quality as the home product are not so easy to sell and most of them are going at 20c to 20 1-2c.

Receipts of eggs are not quite so heavy and the demand is increasing. Since the retail price was cut generally to 25c a dozen the public is buying more eggs than formerly.

With the opening of the Lenten season tomorrow there will naturally be a still greater call for eggs and this is expected to keep the trade rather steady for a while at least.

Butter market continues mixed. City creamery is being maintained at 32c to 34c a pound in prints, while outside stocks (state brands) are being sold from 29c to 30c, except for the better known ones which are selling at the same price as city creamery.
