Arid and Semi-Arid Lands of the West to be Reclaimed-Amount Sufficient to Build Pive Battleships Will be Loaned to Settlers on Various Projects.

Chicago, Ill., March 3 .- What reclamation by irrigation means to the country is strongly indicated by the recent announcement of the United States reclamation service that \$48. 000,000 is to be expended during the next four years in furthering the work of the government in reclaiming semi-arid and arid lands in the armor plate business to make money, west. 000,000 a month, While this expenditure would pay for five battleships, it is in the case of the reclamation service only a loan to be returned to the United States treasury and re-employed for reclamation work. The settler on a government project has ten years in which to pay for his land and water, while the returns under irrigation are in many cases so abundant that one or two crops will repay the cost.
