MEXICAN ALLIANCE WITH JAPAN DENIED BY MINISTER

Financial Representative of Southern Republic Insists There Is No Possible Excuse for American Invasion-Declares Report That Japan Is Financing Insurrection Is Ab-

Washington, March 12.-11.-The reports that Wall street financial interests have decided that Diaz must retire in order to prevent anarchy in Mexico were given strength today by the simultaneous appearance of Am-bassador De La Barra and Attorney General Wickersham here. It is stated that a conference has been called in the hope of settling the Mexican troubles by selecting Yves Limantour, the Mexican minister of finance, as Diaz' successor,

Limantour Makes Statement, New York, March 11.—Insisting his government had not formed any alliance with Japan and that there could not be any cause for possible American invasion, Limantour, the Mexican minister of finance, issued a statement saying the report that PORTLAND ARCHITECTS TAKE Japan is financing the insurrection is absurd.

Limantour said in part: "As I set forth in my statement yesterday, my government does not for a moment consider intervention. I think the United States has no intention of in-tervening. Naturally Mexico desires the United States to prevent the smuggling of arms and recruits from the United States. That is what the American troops expect to do.
