PRISONERS TAKEN TO STATE PENITENTIARY

FOUR MEN RECENTLY CONVICTED ON WAY TO SALEM

Others Are Sentenced by Judge Phelps—Roy Neal Given Four Years—Payrole Under Advisement.

Sheriff T. D. Taylor and Deputy Joe Blakesley left this morning for Salem having in their custody four men convicted at the recent adjourned term of the circuit court and who were sentenced to terms in the state penitentiary. The prisoners in question were Donovan Ragan, sentenced to five years for burglarizing a box-car at Umatilla, James Phoney and William Allen, each of whom drew two years for breaking into a section house at Echo, and Christopher Columbus Taylor, the Echo-forgery who

got off with a sentence of one and a half years when he pleaded guilty.

Others Are Sentenced.

Judge Phelps this morning passed sentence on several other men who were either convicted after a trial or who pleaded guilty to the charges against them. Roy S. Neal, who pleaded guilty to forging a note at Stanfield, was sentenced to four years in the penitentiary and his application for a parole was taken under advisement. William Brown who turned state evidence against his partner in crime, Donovan Ragan, was sentenced to the penitentiary without limitation of time, while Harry Luton, the Indian convicted of stealing a horse, drew a year and a half.

A number of cases were dismissed this morning, they having been settled out of court. The titles of these cases follow:

Box Car Robbers Convicted.
The jury in the case of Charles Foote and Albert Thompson indicted for burglarizing a box-car at Umatilla, returned a verdict of guilty late Saturday afternoon and they will be sentenced tomorrow morning.
