New York, Mar. 13.—Scores of fashionably clad women, impelled by curiosity and the lure of mystery, gathered at an auction room in Broadway Wednesday to bid on an offering of forty-three pieces of baggage, once the property of Mrs. Howard Gould, but placed on the block by the Hotel St. Regis for an alleged debt.

The auction was carried on after the manner of the old game of buying "a pig in a poke." The auctioneer was perfectly frank about that, but the mystery as to the contents of the trunks and boxes only added to the interest. The lot included twenty-two trunks supposed to contain wearing apparel, eight boxes of a kind that indicated that they might contain hats, and a variety of handbags and other bundles.
