Engine on Road Grader. Winona, Wash.—Experiments have been made the last few days by Fockler & Carpenter in attaching a gasoline traction engine to a road grader.

Kills 19 Cougars in Winter. Grangeville, Idaho.—According to a letter received here from Charles French, a trapper camped on the Middle Fork of the Clearwater river, 19 cougars and four lynx have fallen to his rifle during the winter.

Death in Auto Mechanism. Portland, Ore.—While demonstrating an auto truck to a prospective purchaser Tuesday, A. A. Denzel was caught in the "ramping" mechanism and instantly killed.

Bank Deposits Increase. Medford, Or.—According to the statements issued in response to a call from the controller of the currency for the close of business March 7, there are on deposit in Medford banks \$2,128,955.60.

HERMISTON HAS NEW OFFICE BUILDING

SCROGGS QUILS BUSINESS FOR RECLAMATION SERVICE

Becomes Assistant Water Distributor—School Children Send Letters of Invitation to Eastern Friends and Relatives.

(Special Correspondence.) Hermiston, Ore., March 15.—The Hermiston Building & Contracting company has finished its new office building next to the Inland Empire Lumber company and will soon move here from Pendleton.

Maurice D. Scroggs has sold his interest in the Hermiston Produce and Supply company and has accepted a position with the reclamation service as assistant to James Griffin, the chief of water distribution.

Yesterday was letter day in this city, the school children wrote several hundred letters to all parts of the United States, the Commercial club furnishing the stamps for mailing, each letter enclosing one of the Hermiston booklets.

The building and ground of the Pioneer Livery and Feed Stables have been sold by Emery & Giesy to Jack Moore, a former Konevick man. The formal transfer was made Monday, but the barn was leased at once by the former owners of it.

A. F. Howes of Hood River spent several days here this week looking for a location.

There are several people arriving every day looking at homesteads in the fourth unit which will be opened the 22nd of this month, and it is now expected that there will be a line up at La Grande on the day of the opening. This land includes some of the best land on the project, some 40 acre tracts will be opened for entry, but the majority are small tracts, running from 10 acres to 25 acres of the irrigable lands.
