PRO-AMERICAN JAPS VICTORS

Effort to Impeach Prime Minister Katsura and his Cabinet Fails Utterly.

GOVERNMENT DETERMINED TO REMAIN FRIENDLY

Anti-American Nationalist Party Demanded Censure for Approval of New Treaty-Held that Japanese Had Been Mumiliated Because No New Concessions Were Granted.

Tokio, Japan, March 21 .- Efforts by the anti-American nationalist par-ty to impeach Prime Minister Katsura and his cabinet today in the diet failed utterly. Foreign Minister Komura took occasion to declare that the Japanese government was determined to maintain friendly relations with the United States,

The resolutions demanded censure for the cabinet, alleging that the recent United States treaty "humiliat-ed" the Japanese because no further privileges were granted them.

Replying to the charges, Komura declared the Japanese had been plactreaty, as regards immigration, with all other nations.
