

SPECULATORS STILL FORCING MARKET

PORTLAND AND PUGET SOUND PRICES ARE IDENTICAL

Exporters Are Still Out of the Market as Price is Too High for Business—Coarse Grain Market is Gaining Strength.

(Tuesday's Journal.) Speculators continue to force the market for wheat here and are paying the same quotations for Portland delivery as for Puget sound. Other buyers say they have not bid above \$1c for club, although sales have been confirmed here as high as \$4c. Even the lower figure is a cent above what the same interests have been offering.

On the basis of export shipment the wheat market here today is far beyond the business price. Export price for club here is about 7 1/2 track delivery or 4c under the lowest figure offered and 7c below the highest price. Foreign interests are not keen

to take hold even at the low prices. Europe is still being fed all the winter wheat needed. South America and Australia, as well as Russia, are the principal shippers at this time and as long as the offering is free at current quotations, no advance for the Pacific northwest grain may be expected for exporting.

Coarse grain market is gaining strength, but values are generally stationary with only a nominal movement now reported.

Potato Growers Holding. The market for potatoes here is holding rather firm with only a limited business passing.

Dealers generally are offering \$1.40 per cental at country shipping points for good shipping stock, but as high as \$1.50 continues to be offered for selected stock. Only a few cars of the latter remain unsold in this section.

Farmers generally are of the opinion that higher prices will prevail for potatoes, and for that reason many are again inclined to hold back. Just what they expect to get for their stock they are unwilling to say except that more money will be offered after a while.

Notwithstanding this determination to hold for an advance, lower prices are again ruling in the south. At San Francisco Oregon potatoes are down another nickel.

This is due to the greater shipments from other places recently. An effort is being made by some speculators to check the movement from Oregon, so as to make a better market for their stock at San Francisco. In the former they have succeeded, but the work has as yet had no effect upon the southern trade.

Demand for seed potatoes is again showing an increase here. Planting is now general and plowing is shown everywhere. Fancy American Wonder seed sells from \$1.60 to \$1.65 per cental on front street, while Burbanks go at \$1.50.

Storing Eggs. Storage of eggs has become general all along the Pacific coast.

Receipts for the fresh egg market are not so liberal as the trade here is holding firm at 20c a dozen for small lots of candled goods.

Storage operators are generally offering 19c a dozen for supplies landed at Portland, and these do not enter the trade at all.

For a while it was believed that the stricter government regulations would have a tendency to stop the storage of eggs to some extent, but after the first scare the trade has settled down to a normal basis. It has been proposed that the government prohibit the holding in storage of eggs longer than three months, but the trade in general expects the measure to be amended so that a year's time will be allowed.

In California the governor recently signed Senator Hare's bill that provided that eggs or butter held in storage more than three months shall be labeled with the date they were put in storage when exposed for sale. This measure is expected to stop the selling of storage eggs as fresh stock by commission men or retailers.

Livestock at Standstill. The market for livestock was at a standstill this morning on account of exhibits at the yards, but late trading shows definite direction of values. Receipts for the day were nominal, but this was a point in favor of better values.

Hogs took a turn for the better all through the east today, advancing at all centers. There was an advance of 10c at South Omaha, which put the top price there to \$8.55 or \$8.75 to land here, while Chicago was generally 10c above yesterday, with the run not so liberal.

Locally the hog market seems inclined to drop to the basis of what stuff can be landed here from the east, and latest sales have been made but a fraction above the cost of Omaha supplies.

Market for sheep is firm at the advance quoted exclusively by The Journal yesterday. Only a nominal number of sheep came forward to the market today.

KEEPING ROADS OPEN. Mexican Railway Officials Putting Forth Strenuous Efforts.

That Mexico is making every effort to keep its lines of railway open in spite of the activity of the insurgents is evidenced by the heavy purchases of ties and bridge material which have been made in Houston within the past few days. Henry Mel, purchasing agent of the National Railroads of Mexico, has had his headquarters there for two weeks or more and has been rushing railroad building material and supplies of all kinds across the Rio Grande.

Much of the activity relative to the handling of the big body of troops rushed to Texas by the United States centered in Houston as all of the soldiers ordered to Galveston were compelled to pass through this city as were also the majority of the forces from the South Atlantic states ordered to Fort Sam Houston. In the event of a threatened move against any element in the Republic across the border, Houston would become one of the strong strategic points as it is the terminus of the St. Louis, Brownsville and Mexico line which connects directly at Matamoros with the Mexican National and is also the largest city with water and rail connections which links the International and Great Northern railway directly with the border.

Newspaper correspondents and telegraph operators were the first to arrive in this city in advance of the

troops. Then came the soldiers from Pensacola, Mobile and Georgia. Owing to the sudden movements of troops into this state, the commissary force of the department of Texas was hard pressed to meet the demands made upon it and Houston wholesalers were called upon to supply large quantities of supplies which were rushed to Fort Sam Houston and Fort Crockett.

M. for sprinkling the streets of the city of Pendleton for the season of 1911, the districts to be sprinkled are as follows, viz:

District No. 1. All streets on the north side of the Umatilla river.

District No. 2. All streets on the south side of the Umatilla River, west of the east line of Main street, and north of the south line of Webb street.

District No. 3. All streets lying east of a line be-

ginning at the intersection of the east line of Main street with the Umatilla river, thence following the east line of Main street to the south line of Webb street, thence following the south line of Webb street east to the west line of Vincent street, thence following the west line of Vincent street east to the north line of Bluff street, thence following the north line of Bluff street east, to the termination thereof, thence southerly to the City limits.

District No. 4. All streets south of the south line of Webb street, and west of the west line of Vincent street.

The City to furnish sprinklers, wagons and water, and the contractor to furnish horses, harness and driver, and to put up and take down all stand pipes etc.; separate proposals will be received for each district, and no contract will be awarded to any one bidder for more than one district, the hours of sprinkling to be in accordance with the orders of the Street Committee, all bids shall specify the price per team and man per day of 10 hours, time when teams are not engaged in sprinkling to be deducted.
