vulsions and great pain, while they say the two dying lads showed more the effects of narcotic poisoning, being in a stupor some time before death ensued. Dr. Herbert Leiser, one of the physicians called into the case, says that he doubts the theory of ptomaine poisoning and believes that a narcotic is responsible for the deaths of the lads. He found a box of a proprietary medicine said to contain a strong narcotic in the room and took possession of it. began to vomit the woman says she gave them mustard in the hope of relieving their pain, but she did not consider them sick enough to call a physician. When the autopsy is held the cor-

TRAINS ARE RUNNING OVER DOUBLE TRACKS

NO. 17 IS FIRST TO MAKE TRIP ON THE NEW RAILS

Conductor Patrick H, Murphy Pilots First String of Passenger Coache Over Improvement,

The first train to be run over the double tracks of the O.-W. R. & N. between this city and the Deschutes river, was No. 17, due here last evening at 5 o'clock, in charge of Engineer Ben Wilkes, on engine No. 198, and Conductor "Hon." Patrick H. Mahaffey, says yesterday's The Dalles Chronicle. The new system gives added facilities for handling of traffic, putting into service a pass-track 15 miles in length which will save considerable time and trouble in handlng trains. Although the running time of the passengers will be no

Active operations are on in the preparations to continue the double track east of the Deschutes river oridge to Bialock, 45 miles from The Dalles. Twohy Brothers also have the contract for the construction work and have established camps at mileposts 114, 115 and 118. At these points spurs have been cut into the main line for the use of work trains. Twelve carloads of supplies, including dump cars and pony engines, have been unloaded at these camps. Crows, numbering 500 men, are now on the ground and this number will be increased to 3000 before many weeks have passed.

The double-tracking will eliminate to a great degree the heavy curvatures and to accomplish this a great deal of heavy cut work in solid rock will be necessitated. Ninety pound steel is being used for the double tracks, all of which will be protected by a double block system that practically eliminates all possibility of ac-
