SHEEP PRICES MAY BE FORCED HIGHER

SENSATIONAL ADVANCE IN BAILEY MARKET

Eastern Demand for Mutton and Brewing Material Causes Increase in the Northwest.

(Friday's Journal.)
The sheep market is firmer here but prices are showing practically no change for the day. Arrivals were nominal. Higher prices are being forced in the east and this is certain to have an effect upon conditions here.

With competitive markets higher, the sheep will go in the direction where the best prices are available. For that reason local buyers will be compelled to bid up. For the general run of wethers the price here is \$4.75. At Omaha it is \$5.25. Lambs are quoted here at \$5.50 for best quality, while the Omaha price is \$6.45. Portland is quoting \$4.25 for ewes while at Omaha the market stands around \$5.00.

While there was a further drop in the price of hogs at eastern centers the local market was practically unchanged this morning. Extra fine light stuff is generally quoted around \$8.00.

Two loads of Montana cattle came forward to the yards today. Demand is practically as previously reported. Prices are showing no change.

Egg Prices Firm.
Egg prices stand no higher than 21c a dozen. While there has been talk of still higher values, nothing above 21c has been confirmed along the street. Sales that were made beyond this are said to include delivery, which would take off the additional cent a dozen charged.

Receipts of eggs are increasing. "I will sell anyone all the eggs they want at 21c a dozen," says Harry Wimpole of the Wimpole Produce company. "There is a lot of hot air about the egg market, but if anyone wants to buy today I will sell at the price quoted. Those that are asking more will have to come down from their high horse, because the market will not stand it."

Offering of eastern eggs at 19c a dozen by the carlots has had the effect of quieting the excited dealers who received a case now and then, and on this account try to establish a market. Once in a while a small handler will be able to secure a fractional advance over the market, but the price is generally made on what the bulk of the street's receipts will move at.

Sensational Barley Advance.
Sensational advances are being forced in the coarse grain market as the result of extremely higher prices in the east. A shortage in the offerings of barley, has sent eastern quotations to the highest point since 1886.

Locally there has been a further advance of \$1 a ton in the price of feed barley, quotations ranging between \$25 and \$25.50 and purchases hard to make at the advancing figures.

Eastern interests continue to demand our brewing barley at interior centers and are secretly bidding much higher prices than those available publicly.

Oats market here has been affected by the sharply higher price for barley and as high as \$28.50 is being offered for No. 1 white here.

Wheat market shows an advance of a cent higher, both for club and buestem. Principal millers say they are not in the market at all just now. The Chicago Inter-Ocean today says of the barley situation there:

"Fancy malting barley sold at \$1.13 yesterday, the highest since September, 1886. In 1907 prices touched \$1.10, while in 1888 sales were made at \$1.02. An advance of 9¢ in a week has been absolutely without speculation and it is doubtful if values would have reached such a figure if there had been trading in barley futures, as the malters might have bought for future delivery some time ago, which would have necessitated bringing all the Pacific coast surplus to markets in the central west to make deliveries and would have stopped exports from the Pacific coast at comparatively low prices."

"Although malters were anxious buyers yesterday, they expressed the opinion at the close that the advance was about enough for the time being, as they had secured fairly liberal supply by purchases made to arrive and even the most rampant bulls regarded the market as strained, although they continued to predict \$1.25 later in the season."

All streets on the south side of the Umatilla River, west of the east line of Main street, and north of the south line of Webb street.

District No. 3.
All streets lying east of a line beginning at the intersection of the east line of Main street with the Umatilla river, thence following the east line of Main street to the south line of Webb street, thence following the south line of Webb street east to the west line of Vincent street, thence following the west line of Vincent street east to the north line of Bluff street, thence following the north line of Bluff street east, to the termination thereof, thence southerly to the City limits.

District No. 4.
All streets south of the south line of Webb street, and west of the west line of Vincent street.

The City to furnish sprinklers, wagons and water, and the contractor to furnish horses, harness and driver, and to put up and take down all stand pipes etc.; separate proposals will be received for each district, and no contract will be awarded to any one bidder for more than one district, the hours of sprinkling to be in accordance with the orders of the Street

Committee, all bids shall specify the price per team and man per day of 10 hours, time when teams are not engaged in sprinkling to be deducted. The city reserves the right to reject any and all bids.
