

CATTLE AND SHEEP TAKE SHARP ADVANCE

CONDITIONS IN EAST AND MIDDLE WEST REFLECTED

Movement of Western Mutton May Start Away from Instead of Toward Portland.

(Monday's Journal.) Sheep market here is showing an improvement, as exclusively forecast by the Journal recently. The improvement in the east and central west has already had its effect upon the local trade and sales were generally made here at an advance of 25c over what could be obtained for similar quality a few days ago.

The week's market started with a very fair shipment of cattle and sheep and one load of hogs. There was a further strengthening of the sheep trade in the east today. At Chicago the market was strong with no change in prices but an advance of a dime was quoted at South Omaha, with the increasing disposition to purchase. Wethers were quoted in the Nebraska yards today at \$5 to \$5.31 for old and \$5.35 to \$7.75 for yearlings with ewes at \$4.75 to \$5.10 and lambs at \$6.25 to \$6.50.

Local prices were considerably under these, but nevertheless the improvement in the buying was marked. Local interests have come to realize that unless they offer more for sheep the movement will be away from instead of toward Portland.

Cattle Market Stronger

Market for cattle was somewhat stronger at North Portland today. Quality of offerings was not very good and considering this the prices obtained were somewhat better than recently obtained in the cattle division. Three loads that came upon today's market were those recently sent away from the yards by Kidwell & Caswell owing to the lack of demand at suitable prices. The stock was fed at the Sun Dial ranch at Troutdale. The stuff offered today in the cattle pens brought about 15c to 25c more than it would a week ago.

Only one load of hogs was available for the local trade today. There was a weaker tone in Chicago for swine and values were 5c to 10c lower, with tops ranging around \$7.15, while at South Omaha swine were stronger with tops at \$6.50. This means that it cost \$7.60 to land supplies at Pacific northeast centers.

Many Irings in Potatoes

Outside potatoes are being offered the local trade and some small shipments are coming forward to Front street. Another car has arrived from there. Shipments are being offered from Idaho and while none have been purchased to date, the trade is seriously considering importations.

Idaho and Yakima stock is showing much larger sizes than the bulk of the present local offering and while the quality is not as good as the best local growth, there is a certain trade that prefers the larger potato, notably hotels and restaurants, and therefore they are willing to pay a better price for the best of these.

Best quality potatoes are selling as high as \$1.85 in a small way along Front street. At country shipping points \$1.50 is being freely offered for the best, and it is reported, but not confirmed, that \$1.55 and \$1.60 has been offered and paid in a limited way in the country.

Outside markets continue to show an indifferent tone, especially at California centers, where the offerings from the east are competing for trade.

Potato planting is extremely heavy in eastern Multnomah and Clackamas. Japanese growers are planting more acreage than ever before.

Coarse Grain Still Soaring

Coarse grain prices are still jumping upward in the Pacific northwest and new high records for this season's movement are again showing.

Barley supplies are so scarce that buyers are anxiously bidding \$25 to \$25.50 for No. 1 feed basis track delivery Portland and nominally brewing is \$1.50 a ton higher than this. Demand for the latter cereal is limited locally because the wants of practically all Pacific northwest brewers have been filled.

Today's quotations on barley are fully 50c a ton above previous quotations and buyers say it is extremely hard to secure even limited supplies at the high figure.

A further advance of 50c a ton is

offering in the oats trade here. No. 1 white is quoted at \$28 and \$25.50, and is strong at these prices. Holders seem to be asking more money. The advance in oats is caused directly by the strength and rise in the barley trade and therefore future quotations in the former line depend upon how the latter acts.

Another cent has been added to the premium offering for bluestem wheat. Supplies available in the open market are small and as high as 86c has been offered for a limited supply, basis track delivery.

Mohair Is Firm

Market for mohair is firm at 32c a pound here. The higher price is now being offered by all interests.

Supplies of hair are now coming forward quite freely and the trade for the season has started in earnest. Practically all the buying to date here has been for the account of mills and speculation is entirely lacking thus far.

Goat shearing is well under way throughout the Willamette valley. Outside of the Dallas pool, none of the associations have thus far named their date of auction.

Samples of eastern Oregon and eastern Washington wools are being received by the local trade in an effort to sell. The quality offered is generally superior to a year ago, being extremely low prices for wool and manufacturers' bids are not extensive. American markets continue to show much cleaner, although the hair is not so long.

CHICAGO CATTLE HIGHER

The Market Is Steady to a Dime Up Today.

Chicago, March 27.—Run: Hogs, 45,000; cattle, 17,000; sheep, 22,000. Hogs are 5c to 10c lower; left over, 1900. Receipts a year ago, 23,000. Mixed, \$6.50@7.95; heavy, \$6.60@6.80; rough, \$6.35@6.75; light, \$6.70@7.15.

Cattle—Steady to 10c higher.

Sheep—Strong.

Importing Butter

The great scarcity of local make of butter is forcing the trade here to order additional supplies from outside points. The east and California are again being drawn upon for supplies and in consequence the market is showing much strength. Were it not for the fact that it is so close to the flush season, prices would in all probability be advanced by local makers.

Notwithstanding the great strength of the creamery butter market here at this time, present quotations are not as high as last year, views of the trade to the contrary. An examination of the actual sales of butter a year ago shows that on this date best creamery was quoted in prints at 36c a pound, compared with the present market for similar pack at 32 1-2c per pound. Previous to this time, a year ago, the differential was even greater. While local prices have been holding around 32 1-2c for prints recently, a year ago the market stood at 40c during January, February and about half of March. During the first part of April, 1910, creamery prints of city make were quoted at 33c a pound or half a cent above the present price of similar make.

Eastern butter is coming forward in cubes and is cut up here, selling at 30 and 31c a pound, with an excellent demand. Best California is selling in prints here at 31c.

Good brands of country creamery are holding firm and for some of these city prices are being offered.

District No. 3. All streets lying east of a line beginning at the intersection of the east line of Main street with the Umatilla river, thence following the east line of Main street to the south line of Webb street, thence following the south line of Webb street east to the

west line of Vincent street, thence following the west line of Vincent street east to the north line of Bluff street, thence following the north line of Bluff street east, to the termination thereof, thence southerly to the City limits.
