

HIGHER PRICES IN WHEAT MARKET

BLUESTEM WHEAT SCARCE; SOME BUYERS STARTING

Are Offering from 87 to 89 Cents a Bushel—Lack of Rain Is Harmful to Wool—Live Stock Trade Is Firm

(Wednesday's Journal.) Sharply higher prices are again offering in the wheat trade. Demand for bluestem is forcing millers to pay a further advance.

Leading operators say that bluestem supplies in the country are extremely scarce and in fact all wheat is not nearly as plentiful as some interests had anticipated.

Coarse grains show a further advance and local interests, buying for eastern account are offering for brewing barley. This would mean \$23 landed at Portland.

Oats market is following other grains and as high as \$23 has been offered for No. 1 white, although the general price is \$23.50.

Market for cattle and sheep is steady with the latter showing additional strength. There were only limited arrivals for the day, totals being 182 cattle, 58 calves and 240 sheep.

Most of the cattle that came forward were supplies that were recently taken off the local market for want of demand at suitable prices and were put on feed at the Sun Dial ranch near Troutdale.

There was no first class cattle offering in the North Portland yards today and therefore extreme top quotations were not paid nor offered. The

best stuff was that brought from the fed lot by Kidwell & Caswell. Good sheep are scarce and therefore in this line top quotations were not tested during the day's trading.

Further weakness and price loss were shown in eastern hogs during the day. At Chicago there was a decline of 5c with a run 11,000 greater than a year ago while at Omaha the market struck bearish sentiment and a decline of 10c followed.

So fierce has been the fight that has waged in this territory during the past season between the condensed milk companies and the creamery interests, that all sides are said to be operating at a loss.

To this condition was due the extreme scarcity of fresh local butter during the past season and the forced importations of several times the normal amount from eastern and middle west centers for the Oregon trade.

For a like reason the price of condensed milk was forced during the season to its highest record. The price of the canned product went to such an extreme figure that consumption was curtailed and many retailers absolutely refused to sell the product because there was no profit in its handling.

Practically a similar condition ruled in the cheese market. Condensed milk manufacturers invaded the territory of the Tillamook cheese makers. The result was that both sides began to bid higher for butter fat.

Lack of rains and with heavy winds, are causing discoloration of recently shorn wool. While first samples of wool received here were of extremely good quality because of their clean appearance, latest arrivals are even worse than during recent years. A good rain is needed to clean the fleece.

Shearing is now general. At North Yakima and Prosser and at other points along the Northern Pacific, operations are quite extensive. Shearing is progressing quite favorably around Echo, Ore., and operations have started at Heppner. At Arlington shearing will start within a day or so.

Market for wool shows no improvement and growers are beginning to realize that the trade cannot offer the quotations of a year ago.

Egg Storage Is On. Egg storage is under full swing in this market. Receipts are heavier but the surplus is being quickly removed to the egg houses. Prices rule from 21c for the fresh market to 20¢ 1-2 for storage.

Front street trade is hurt considerably by the shipment of liberal supplies from the country direct to retailers. Most of these shipments are for a far greater amount than the retailers can use and they are forced to throw the balance of the arrivals upon the market at cut quotations.

TODAY'S BIRTHDAY SKETCH.

The subject of today's sketch is the famous daughter of a famous mother. She is Mrs. Maude Howe Elliot, the youngest daughter of the late Julia Ward Howe and wife of the celebrated English painter, John Elliot. Today through her writings, Mrs. Elliot bids fair to be the equal in literary genius of her more than distinguished mother.

A great deal of Mrs. Elliot's life has been spent in Rome, and there her drawing room has been the center of American intellectual life in Italy. She is a brilliant conversationalist and in the several volumes which she has published has given more than an impression of literary genius. Mrs. Elliot began her literary career early, her first work being a novel. She has written much on the social life in Rome and other European cities.

Before her mother's death, Mrs. Elliot's readings at Newport were the closing events of the season. These readings were always held in the drawing rooms of the richest women in the summer colony. It was through the success of these readings that Mrs. Elliot decided to go upon the lecture platform in many other cities of the country.
