San Francisco, April 1.—Jack Johnson's last hope of escaping a jail sentence for speeding vanished today when the supreme court refused to give a habeas corpus. Johnson, in the meantime is spending time in the county jail.

According to Lieutenant H. W. Hall of the Fourth cavalry, Lawrence Converse and William Blatt, now in jail at Juarez, were not arrested on American soil, but were taken back on American territory twice while being conducted from Guadalupe, where they were captured, to Juarez. Lieutenant Hall and inspectors of the customs service followed the trail of the captors, and declare it shows plainly on the north side of the mountains marking the boundary. A map of the trail will be submitted to the state department.

Repairs were completed yesterday on the Mexican Northwestern and freight traffic will be resumed today. This will afford the relief to the Mormon colonies which are in need of provisions. If freight traffic is not interrupted, an attempt will be made to resume the running of passenger trains next Monday.
