DEMOCRATS STORM CAPITAL.

Washington, April 4.—Representative James R. Mann of Illinois, was unanimously chosen candidate for speaker and floor leader by the republicans of the house at a caucus held last night. He was proposed to the caucus committee by former Speaker Cannon and received the support of the regulars and those insurgents who were present.

He carried the republican vote in the house today and will become the active head of the minority party in the house. More than a dozen insurgents were not present.

In accepting the speakership, Champ Clark said in part: "My democratic brethren—Coupled with the joy of again seeing in this house the majority which is of my political faith is a keen sense of responsibility to my country. We are put on trial and our duty devolves upon us to demonstrate not so much by fine phrases as by good works that we are worthy of the confidence reposed in us by the voters of the land; that we are worthy of still wider confidence. That we will prove equal to the emergency through our own efforts and our own desires I don't doubt, and the way to accept this is to fulfill with courage, intelligence and patriotism the promises we made before election."

Promises Revision of Tariff.
Clark added that the democrat's chief promises were the revision of the tariff downward and the passing of a resolution submitting to the states a constitutional amendment providing for the election of U. S. senators by popular vote, such changes in rules of the house as are necessary for thorough intelligent consideration of the measures before it and also to carry out the economy of public expenses in order that labor may be more lightly burdened.

"In the literal fulfillment of our retrenchment promises we begun by cutting the houses running expenses by one hundred eighty-eighty thousand dollars annually. The economy like charity, begins at home."
