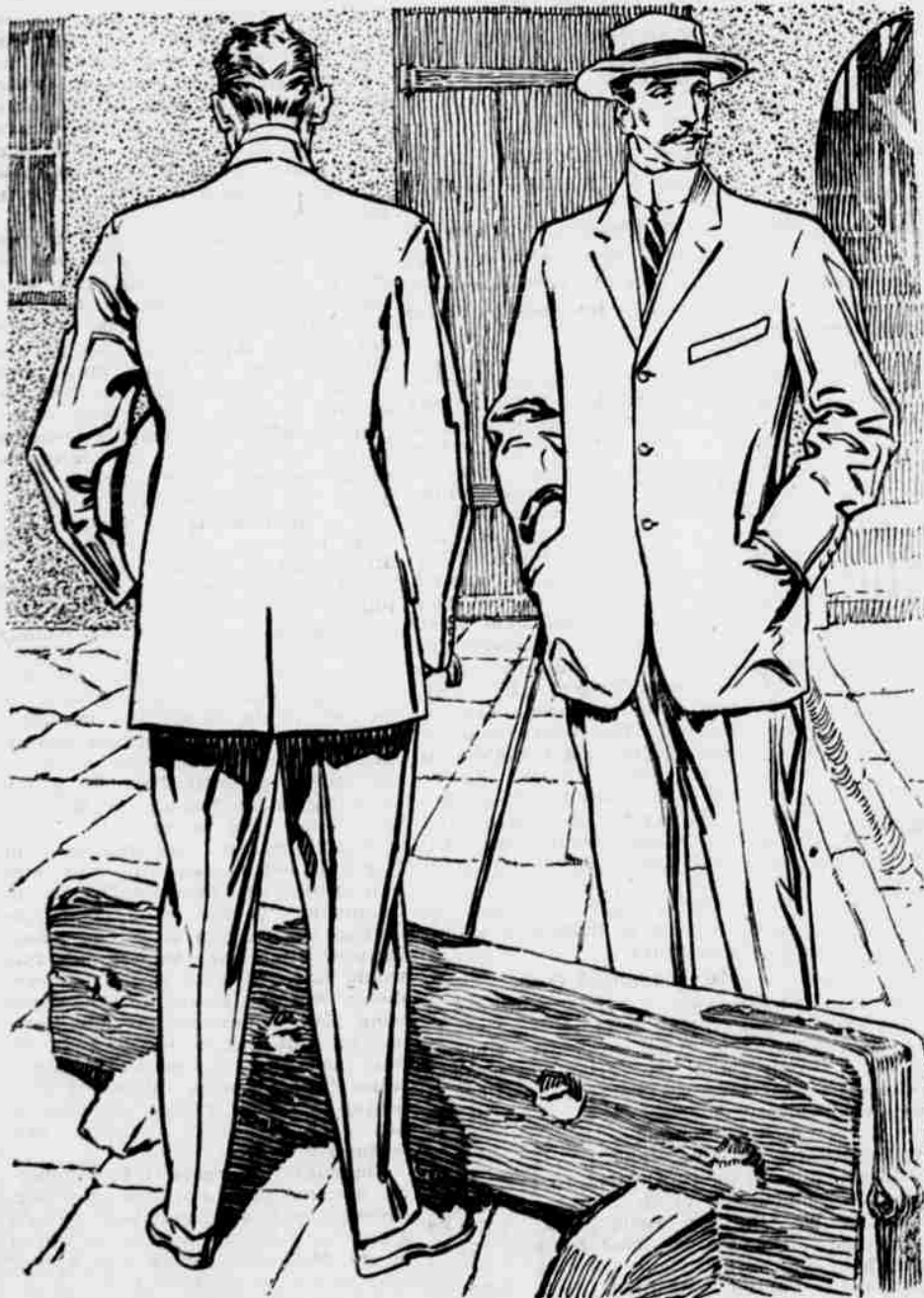

UMATILLA INDIANS TO FEATURE AT ASTORIA

CENTENNIAL DATES ARE AUGUST 10 TO SEPT. 9

Twenty Members of the Umatilla Indians Together With Many Relics Will be Represented at Celebration.

To have the Umatilla Indians a feature of the Astoria Centennial to be held August 10 to September 9, is the plan of John Day, publicity manager of the exposition who was in Pendleton Tuesday afternoon, making the arrangements for twenty members of the Umatilla tribe to be present during the celebration. Mr. Day had an interview with Major Moorhouse while in the city and the latter gentleman was so enthusiastic over the proposition that he has offered his \$10,000 collection of Indian relics to be put on exhibition during the celebration. It is planned to have the Indians participate in many of the athletic contests that are being arranged for the benefit of the visitors. There will be boat racing, ball games and many other events in which the Indians will be invited to take an active part. Mr. Day was highly pleased with the encouragement he received from Major Moorhouse and he will advertise the Indian exhibit as one of the features of the exposition.

Astoria centennial is to celebrate the first settlement of the Northwest by the white man, April 12, 1811, the Tonquin, a trading ship owned by John Jacob Astor, sailed into the mouth of what is now the Columbia river, and proceeded up ten miles to a cove where the crew landed, and established a camp to facilitate trading with the Indians. This camp became known as Astoria. It grew from a trading expedition, sent out from New York by John Jacob Astor. It is to celebrate this event that the Astoria Centennial was projected.

The state of Oregon has appropriated \$50,000 to aid in the expenses of this exposition. Clatsop county made a tax levy which raised \$25,000; the merchants of Astoria raised \$50,000 more; Colonel John Jacob Astor of New York City donated \$10,000 and other private contributions bring the available funds up to \$150,000 at this date.

This money will be spent to provide a \$12,000 regatta at which the motor speed boat championship will be decided and in the free for all event, the prize money is \$5,000.

Two fleets of battleships will be in the harbor during the Centennial celebration; one British, one U. S. The National Guard of Oregon will be in camp here for a week and the U. S. regular artillerymen have been ordered to play war practice at the same time. Eight conventions, including the Oregon Development League, meet here during the Centennial. A \$12,000 pyrotechnical spectacle will run nightly for two weeks and prove a big attraction. Automobile races will be held on the beach at Gearhart, and there will be a hop and reception for visiting military naval officers. There will be land and marine parades and Glenn Curtiss will have an aeroplane and a hydroplane for flights over land, sea and river. Numerous other features provided, including an opera.

PORTLAND TO BE A FLYLESS TOWN

Portland, Ore., April 12.—Health officers are going to make Portland a flyless town this summer. They promise these disease breeders will be rare indeed and that the fly pest of former summers will be almost wholly abated. The system of flushing the downtown pavements every night, instead of sweeping them as formerly, washes the larva of the flies into the sewers, thus doing away with one of the most favorable breeding places. Every road leading into Portland will be oiled this summer to lay the dust and this treatment completely kills flies and renders their eggs harmless. The oil applied is crude petroleum which contains a small quantity of carbolic acid, and is sure death to flies and mosquitoes.

Dr. Calvin S. White, state health officer, is very active in his warfare on flies. "There remains one dangerous source of fly production," said he, "and that is unscreened food. I would advise every housewife not to buy any article of food from any store that does not use screens. All the food exhibited in markets and elsewhere should be kept screened from flies. they will not bother us and public health will be protected tremendously."

Dr. White has considered the plan to have the city council pass an anti-fly ordinance but he believes the education of the public along the line of leaving no breeding places for the pestiferous fly is more important. Stereopticon slides, showing the dangers to be feared from flies, the best means of destroying them, and preventing them from getting established in the house, will be shown by Dr. White both in the city schools and in public gatherings about the city. A lecture will accompany the pictures, giving instructions how to swat the flies.
