With their hopes revived by the strengthening of the pitching staff, the Pendleton "Buckaroos" will line up against the Athena "Millers" tomorrow on Roundup Park and they promise there will be no more balloon ascensions to leave a bad taste in the mouths of the fans. Athena, last year was not in the running for the pennant, but this year she is off on the right foot and is rated as one of the most formidable aggregations in the league. Picard, the dusky twirler, is on the mound for the "Millers" and is in rare form this season. He has pitched 14 innings in the two games in which he has played and has allowed but eight hits.

**Quiet at Juarez.**

El Paso, April 15.—Though two bands of rebels to the number of 600 are each in the vicinity of Juarez and a federal scouting party at midnight was chased to the city limits, there has been no battle yet. Hundreds Juarez people spent the night here. Navarro moved his troops outside of Juarez today and extended the picket lines four miles south of Juarez.
