### NEWS OF THE NORTHWEST

**Pasco Bank Doubles Capital.**  
 Pasco, Wash.—According to rumor, the capital of the Bank of Pasco has just been increased from \$25,000 to \$50,000. It is expected that there will also be a change in officers and directors.

**Brakeman Injured.**  
 Pasco, Wash.—While A. C. Addison, a brakeman on the Northern Pacific, was wrestling with his fellow workers in the caboose of their train at Lamont, his shoulder was dislocated. Upon arrival here Dr. L. P. Murphy attended him and he will soon be able to resume his work.

**Heart Failure Takes Man of 87.**  
 Hood River, Or.—William Overbaugh, a Columbia river pioneer, who resided here for over 30 years, died suddenly after a hearty breakfast. Mr. Overbaugh was 87 years of age, and after his morning meal walked out from his home and fell dead. Death was attributed to heart failure.

**Drainage Scheme Moves Realty.**  
 White Salmon, Wash.—B. B. Duncan & Co. of Hood River, have purchased 160 acres of H. R. Murray and 80 acres of George Pendleton, in the Camas prairie district. Captain Mitchell has also added to his holdings by the purchase of 40 acres of T. Wrenn Jr. The recent movement in

real estate in the Camas district is due to the court order for the drainage of Conboy lake, embracing an area of 15,000 acres.

**Wrestlers Train.**  
 Portland, Ore.—April 18.—Beginning this week wrestlers who will represent Portland in the national championship of the Amateur Athletic Union next month in Portland will start training. Eddie O'Connell will train them.

**Portland man Appointed.**  
 Aberdeen, Wash.—G. P. Clerin of Portland, formerly interested in the Western Coopersage company, has been made the manager of the Union Coopersage plant of this city, to succeed Clarence Lillie, resigned. It is reported that Mr. Clerin, who formerly lived in Aberdeen, may bring his family back here to live.

**Buys Portland Concern.**  
 Colfax, Wash.—The Inland Milling & Feed company of Colfax has purchased the business at Portland known as the George McMillan Grain company. Sam Boyer, present manager of the Colfax company, will leave for Portland to manage the new business as soon as the Colfax business can be sold.

**Gets \$2000 in Damages.**  
 Aberdeen, Wash.—D. F. Spiegel, of Mismopolis, has been awarded \$2000 in the superior court as damages against the Grays Harbor & Puget Sound Railway for injury to property by the building of the line. He sued for \$4000. This was one of the hardest fought suits contested at the present term of court.

**Methodists Remodel; Cost, \$6500.**  
 Albany, Or.—The trustees of the First Methodist church, which is being rebuilt, have decided to extend the other wing of the structure and put in another gallery as well as build an addition in which a pipe organ will be placed and library room afforded. The new steam heating plant has already been installed. Exclusive of the pipe organ the improvements under way will cost \$6500.

**Survivor of 20 Battles Dies.**  
 Forest Grove, Or.—Paul Jones Ward, aged 68 years, died at his home in this city Tuesday after a few weeks' illness. He served throughout the civil war and participated in nearly every battle of note in the Mississippi valley, was in the Red river campaign and at the battles of Gettysburg, Black River Bridge, Vicksburg, and Nashville, and altogether participated in over 20 hard fought struggles during the rebellion. He fought under Grant, Sherman, Pope, Banks, A. J. Smith, Washburn and Canby.
