CATTLE MARKET GENERALLY WEAKER

HOGS ARE LOWER BY TWENTY-FIVE CENTS

Sheep Trade is Steady—Bids for Club Wheat Are Now Ranging as High as 85 and 86 Cents a Bushel.

In the Stockyards. North Portland—Hogs 25c lower; cattle depressed; sheep steady. South Omaha—Hogs 15 to 15c lower; cattle weak and lower; sheep steady to lower. Chicago—Hogs 10 to 15c lower; cattle weak; sheep weak.

(From Thursday's Journal.) The cattle market was generally weak with buyers trying their best to beat down quotations. The run of the day was small but added to these were the extra fine stock that came through from Idaho Falls and did not find buyers at suitable prices yesterday.

There was a good run of sheep and lambs in the yards today and the trade was considered steady around previous quotations. Some old wethers sold at \$4.75 weighed off cars while yearling wethers brought \$5.

Hogs were weaker and sales were made today fully 25c lower all around.

Cattle—Grain fed steers, \$7.05; best hay fed steers, \$6.50; fancy, \$6.25; cows, best, \$5.25@5.50; ordinary, \$5.00; poor, \$3.00@4.00; stags and bulls, \$3.00@4.00.

Hogs—Best light, \$7.00@7.25; ordinary, \$7.00; heavy, \$5.00@6.20; feeders, \$7.50.

Sheep—Best yearling wethers, \$5; old wethers, \$4.75; grain fed lambs, \$5.25; ewes, \$4.25; sheared wool sheep and lambs, 50c higher.

Calves—Best, \$3.00@3.50; ordinary \$2.00; poor, \$3.00@4.50.

New Factor in Wheat Trade. An amount of the light holding by growers is now stated that bids for club wheat are ranging as high as \$5 and \$6 a bushel, truck delivery, Portland. Highest bids are mostly at \$6, although leading millers say they are unable to pay more than 58c at present.

Wheat movement is restricted on account of the new turn taken by producers. Dealers have revised their estimates of the holdings by farmers and now say there are only about 5,000,000 bushels in the three states. Of this they now estimate that California will need from 1,000,000 to 2,000,000 bushels before the new crop is available for grinding.

A new factor has appeared in the northwest wheat trade. It is now stated that Mexico will soon suspend the payment of duty on importations of wheat, and that Mexican interests will soon be in this territory for supplies. If this should prove true it will have a very bullish effect upon values.

Coarse grain list continues very firm. Buyers say that No. 1 feed barley is worth up to \$28.50 a ton here. In fact \$28 is being freely bid. Even this price is 50c a ton above the average quotations previously printed.

Oats market is firm with buyers generally offering \$29.50 a ton here for No. 1 white.

Flour trade is firmer. Probable advance seems bright.

Spuds Soaring Higher. Price of potatoes along Front street has reached the highest value in many years. Sales were made during the past 24 hours as high as \$2.50 per cental or 25c above the previous high mark.

Market for potatoes is extremely firm. All outside influences are bullish and this therefore has a direct effect upon price making here.

The local trade no longer figures that there will be a sufficient supply of potatoes here to fill the wants of the growing trade and therefore further importations from the east will be absolutely necessary.

NOTICE OF PROPOSED CHARTER AMENDMENT.

(Continued from page six.)

and parcels of land should pay on account of the benefits to be derived from such proposed improvement, and the City Surveyor shall file such plans and specifications and estimates in the office of the Recorder of The City of Pendleton. If the Council shall find such plans, specifications and estimates to be satisfactory, it shall approve the same and shall determine the boundaries of the district benefited and to be assessed for such improvement and the action of the Council in the creation of such an assessment district shall be final and conclusive. The Council shall by resolution declare its purpose of making such improvement, describing the same and including such engineer's estimates of the probable total cost thereof, and also defining the boundaries of the assessment district to be benefited and assessed therefor. The action of the Council in declaring its intention to improve any street or streets or any part or parts thereof, directing the publication of notice thereof, approving and adopting the plans and specifications and estimates of the City Surveyor, and determining the district benefited and to be assessed therefor, may all be done in one and the same act.

(3) The resolution of the Council declaring its purpose to improve the street shall be published for a period shall also be published therewith a notice that the Surveyor's estimate of the proportion of the cost of said work to be charged against each lot, part of lot and parcel of land is on file in the office of the City Recorder, and a copy of such resolution, together with the report of the Surveyor, showing the probable percentage of benefit to be assessed against each lot, part of lot and parcel of land within such district, shall be kept of record in the office of the City Recorder.

(4) Within ten days from the date of the first publication of the notice required to be published in the preceding section, the owners of 80 per cent or more in area of the property within such assessment district may make and file with the City Recorder a written objection or remonstrance against such proposed improvement, and such objection or remonstrance shall be a bar to any further proceeding in the making of such improvement for a period of six months, unless the owners of one-half or more of the property affected as aforesaid shall subsequently petition therefor.

(5) If no such objection or remonstrance be made or filed with the Recorder within the time designated, the Council shall be deemed to have acquired jurisdiction to order the improvements to be made, and the Council may thereafter by ordinance provide for making such improvement, which shall conform in all particulars to the plans and specifications previously adopted.

(6) When the improvement of any street is ordered the Recorder, upon instruction from the Common Council, shall immediately invite proposals for making the same, in accordance with ordinance provided, which proposals shall be opened in the presence of a majority of the Common Council and the contract awarded to the lowest responsible bidder for either the whole of said improvement or such part thereof as will not materially conflict with the completion of the remainder thereof. The Common Council shall have the right to reject any or all proposals received. If all proposals shall be rejected the Common Council shall have power by resolution duly adopted, to order that such improvement, or any portion thereof, may be made under the direction of the Common Council by purchasing the materials and hiring the labor therefor. The Common Council shall have the power to provide for the proper inspection and supervision of all work done under the provisions of this article, and to do any other act to secure the faithful carrying out and the completion of all improvements in strict compliance with the ordinances and specifications therefor, and shall have power to direct that the cost of said improvements, or any portion thereof, shall be paid for by the City.

(7) Upon the signing of the contract, or upon the determination of improvement under its own supervision by purchasing the material and the Common Council to make said improvement, the Council, and there hiring the labor therefor, or as soon thereafter as is reasonably convenient, the Common Council shall proceed to apportion and assess the cost of making such improvement upon the lots, parts of lots and parcels of land within the assessment district, in accordance with the special and peculiar benefits derived by each lot, part of lot and parcel of land. No notice of such hearing and assessment shall be necessary other than

the notice required by subdivision 2 of this section, and all objections or exceptions to the Surveyor's estimate of percentage or any application for raising or lowering the same in any particular shall be filed with the City Recorder within fifteen days after the first publication of such notice, and at such hearing the Common Council shall consider the said City Surveyor's estimates of assessments and all objections thereto, and shall have the power at its discretion, and without any further notice, to consider, ascertain and determine the amount of the special and peculiar benefits accruing to each lot, part of lot or parcel of land within said assessment district by reason of such improvement, and the amount apportioned by the City Surveyor to any lot, part of lot or parcel of land shall be so reduced or increased by the Common Council that it shall be in just proportion to such benefits. But in no case shall any such percentage exceed such benefit. The amount of such assessment against each lot, part of lot and parcel of land shall be declared by ordinance, and the Recorder shall thereupon enter the same in the lien docket of The City of Pendleton, and the same shall thereafter be known as the Recorder's Estimate and Assessment. The contract price, based upon the estimate of the City Surveyor, or if there be no contract, the estimates of the City Surveyor, the cost of right of way and expenses of condemning the land and a sum not exceeding five per cent of the contract price, or the surveyor's estimate as the cost of advertising, engineering and superintendence shall be deemed to be the cost of every improvement.
