

CEREAL TRADE QUIET IN PORTLAND MARKETS

BLUESTEM IS GENERALLY QUOTED AT 90 CENTS Tendency is Not to Bid So High As Formerly—Portland Local Dealer Gets Control of the Potato Market.

(Thursday's Journal.) Cereal trade is quiet all through the Pacific northwest and while prices are showing no change, there is less tendency to quote any further advances. Bluestem wheat, while selling in the north as high as 92c a bushel, in a limited way to millers who are said to have sold four short, and is being purchased for California account at 91c, is not finding bids above 90c generally.

has the bulk of the tubers remaining here. Just what his supplies are he refuses to divulge just now but he acknowledges that he has more than all other dealers combined as well as all that is left in the hands of producers. Mr. Herren has been a very extensive operator in potatoes this season and has accumulated stocks while most of the trade was afraid that the market would drop. He has implicit faith in the future of values, but has been rather conservative in his accumulations. Price \$2.10 in Country. For selected potatoes dealers are still offering \$2.10 per cental at country points. Most of the purchases by other dealers recently have in a roundabout way passed into the hands of Mr. Herren and his corner was accumulated without the trade in general being the wiser. Strawberries Are Higher. A very fancy shipment of strawberries came forward from Los Angeles today and was quoted at higher prices. Florin berries are 25c a crate higher than yesterday. The Los Angeles fruit was of very light color and while some of it was slightly overripe, the general condition was first class. Eastern Eggs Coming. Further shipments of eastern eggs are coming forward to the local market. Trade along Front street is on a firmer basis and some receivers are obtaining 12c in a small way. Others continue to sell at 20c. Chickens Lower Again. A further decline of a cent a pound is showing in the chicken market today. Best lots are being offered at 17c a pound and receivers say they are hard to move at this figure. Receipts of chickens recently have been greater than usual and this has filled the trade to overflowing.

resolution declare its purpose of making such improvement, describing the same and including such engineer's estimates of the probable total cost thereof, and also defining the boundaries of the assessment district to be benefited and assessed therefor. The action of the Council in declaring its intention to improve any street or streets or any part or parts thereof, directing the publication of notice thereof, approving and adopting the plans and specifications and estimates of the City Surveyor, and determining the district benefited and to be assessed therefor, may all be done in one and the same act. (3) The resolution of the Council declaring its purpose to improve the street shall be published for a period of ten days in the official newspaper of the city, with a notice that the Surveyor's estimate of the proportion of the cost of said work to be charged against each lot, part of lot and parcel of land is on file in the office of the City Recorder, and a copy of such resolution, together with the report of the Surveyor, showing the probable percentage of benefit to be assessed against each lot, part of lot and parcel of land within such district, shall be kept of record in the office of the City Recorder. (4) Within ten days from the date of the first publication of the notice required to be published in the preceding section, the owners of 80 per cent or more in area of the property within such assessment district may make and file with the City Recorder a written objection or remonstrance against such proposed improvement, and such objection or remonstrance shall be a bar to any further proceeding in the making of such improvement for a period of six months, unless the owners of one-half or more of the property affected as aforesaid shall subsequently petition therefor. (5) If no such objection or remonstrance be made or filed with the City Recorder within the time designated, the Council shall be deemed to have acquired jurisdiction to order the improvements to be made, and the Council may thereafter by ordinance provide for making such improvement, which shall conform in all particulars to the plans and specifications previously adopted. (6) When the improvement of any street is ordered the Recorder, upon instruction from the Common Council, shall immediately invite proposals for making the same, in accordance with ordinance provided, which proposals shall be opened in the presence of a majority of the Common Council and the contract awarded to the lowest responsible bidder for either the whole of said improvement or such part thereof as will not materially conflict with the completion of the remainder thereof. The Common Council shall have the right to reject any or all proposals received. If all proposals shall be rejected the Common Council shall have power by resolution duly adopted, to order that such improvement, or any portion thereof, may be made under the direction of the Common Council by purchasing the materials and hiring the labor therefor. The Common Council shall have the power to provide for the proper inspection and supervision of all work done under the provisions of this article, and to do any other act to secure the faithful carrying out and the completion of all contracts, and the making of all improvements in strict compliance with the ordinances and specifications thereof, and shall have power to direct that the cost of said improvements, or any portion thereof, shall be paid for by the City. (7) Upon the signing of the contract, or upon the determination of improvement under its own supervision by purchasing the material and the Common Council to make said of ten days in some newspaper to be designated by the Council, and there hiring the labor therefor, or as soon thereafter as is reasonably convenient, the Common Council shall proceed to apportion and assess the cost of making such improvement upon the lots, parts of lots and parcels of land within the assessment district, in accordance with the special and peculiar benefits derived by each lot, part of lot and parcel of land. No notice of such hearing and assessment shall be necessary other than the notice required by subdivision 3 of this section, and all objections or exceptions to the Surveyor's estimates of percentage or any application for raising or lowering the same in any particular shall be filed with the City Recorder within fifteen days after the first publication of such notice, and at such hearing the Common Council shall consider the said City Surveyor's estimates of assessments and all objections thereto, and shall have the power at its discretion, and without any further notice, to consider, ascertain and determine the amount of the special and peculiar benefits accruing to each lot, part of lot or parcel of land within said assessment district by reason of such improvement, and the amount apportioned by the City Surveyor to any lot, part of lot or parcel of land shall be so reduced or increased by the Common Council that it shall be in just proportion to such benefits. But in no case shall any such percentage exceed such benefit. The amount of such assessment against each lot, part of lot and parcel of land shall be declared by ordinance, and the Recorder shall thereupon enter the same in the lien docket of The City of Pendleton, and the same shall thereafter be known as the Recorder's Estimate and Assessment. The contract price, based upon the estimate of the City Surveyor, or if there be no contract, the estimates of the City Surveyor, the cost of right of way and expense of condemning the land and a sum not exceeding five per cent of the contract price, or the Surveyor's estimate as the cost of advertising, engineering and superintendence shall be deemed to be the cost of every improvement. The new craft will be completed by June 1 and will make regular trips as far as the mouth of the Salmon river, which is about 40 miles above Lewiston.

If the Council shall find such plans, specifications and estimates to be satisfactory, it shall approve the same and shall determine the boundaries of the district benefited and to be assessed for such improvement and the action of the Council in the creation of such an assessment district shall be final and conclusive.
