be necessary to determine the boundaries of the subdivision or the division of the irriable area of any land assigned under the provisions of section one of this act a deposit equal to the estimated cost of such survey must be made with an officer to be designated by or on behalf of the parties concerned.

If this law is passed it will give great relief to the desert land owners on this project, as it will then cut some of the large holdings into smaller tracts.

Deputy District Attorney W. C. E. Pruitt was initiated into his new duties shortly after he received his appointment, and he gets the credit of two convictions for his first two cases. He further stated that he had immediately returned it when he learned it was a mistake. McClary stole a saddle to which theft he pleaded guilty.

"At the Old Mill," by George Kleine. This love story is told around a picturesque old mill. The acting is good and there is considerable satisfaction seeing the crusty old landlord relinquish his demand for the girl's hand and bless the two young lovers. There is no question of the attractiveness of this picture.

"Making Bamboo Hats in Java." The natives work with such sprightliness and good humor, the little children amongst them smile so merrily into the camera, that the film holds the attention from first to last.
