## POULTRY RAISING BECOMING IMPORTANT INDUSTRY

Spokane, Wash. — Twenty-four eight months old Plymouth Rock pullets, owned by George E. Peters of Sandpoint, Idaho, produced 2436 eggs the last four months, thereby eclipsing the record made in New York, where a prize of \$5000 was awarded recently to the owner of a flock. This Idaho pullet averaged more than 20 Idaho pullets averaged more than 20 eggs each the last 30 days. Eugene W. Sims, a resident of Sandpoint, also claims a record for his flock of 21 hens, which laid 428 eggs in March. Poultry raising is rapidly becoming an important industry in northern Idaho and eastern Washington and other parts of the inland empire, where the output amounted to \$9,000,000 in 1910, in addition to which it is estimated that more than \$8,000,000 was paid for poultry and eggs produced in Minnesota, Iowa, Illinois, Indiana and other states in the central west. One hundred and fifty cars, or 1,800,000 dozens of eggs, were imported into Spokane last year to supply the market demands of the district, the population of which is estimated at 625,000.

While the hog market is weaker, \$7.25 was obtained for a small lot of extra good stuff this morning. The report of a decline of 50c yesterday was made under a misunderstanding regarding quality. The sale of 57 head averaging 159 pounds yesterday at \$6.75 was for shop stock, and not finished swine as expected. Considering that fact, the market was showing no change in prices.

There was a fair run of sheep and lambs in the yards today but the trade was in excellent condition. Sheep market conditions elsewhere are not so good on account of the increasing run and at Omaha the trade was weaker.

The starting of the California sheep movement in this direction a few days ago was expected to result in a lower price range but the reverse was the case.

## NOTICE OF PROPOSED CHARTER AMENDMENT.

(Continued from page six.)

and parcels of land should pay on account of the benefits to be derived from such proposed improvement, and the City Surveyor shall file such plans and specifications and estimates in the office of the Recorder of The City of Pendleton. If the Council shall find such plans, specifications and estimates to be satisfactory, it shall approve the same and shall determine the boundaries of the district benefited and to be assessed for such improvement and the action of the Council in the creation of such an assessment district shall be final and conclusive. The Council shall by resolution declare its purpose of making such improvement, describing the same and including such engineer's estimates of the probable total cost thereof, and also defining the boundaries of the assessment district to be benefited and assessed therefor. The action of the Council in declaring its intention to improve any street or streets or any part or parts thereof, directing the publication of notice thereof, approving and adopting the plans and specifications and estimates of the City Surveyor, and determining the district benefited and to be assessed therefor, may all be done in one and the same act.

(3) The resolution of the Council declaring its purpose to improve the street shall be published for a period shall also be published therewith a notice that the Surveyor's estimate of the proportion of the cost of said work to be charged against each lot, part of lot and parcel of land is on file in the office of the City Recorder, and a copy of such resolution, together with the report of the Surveyor, showing the probable percentage of benefit to be assessed against each lot, part of lot and parcel of land within such district, shall be kept of record in the office of the City Recorder.

(4) Within ten days from the date of the first publication of the notice required to be published in the preceding section, the owners of 80 per cent or more in area of the property within such assessment district may make and file with the City Recorder a written objection or remonstrance against such proposed improvement, and such objection or remonstrance shall be a bar to any further proceeding in the making of such improvement for a period of six months, unless the owners of one-half or more of the property affected as aforesaid shall subsequently petition therefor.

(5) If no such objection or remonstrance be made or filed with the Recorder within the time designated, the Council shall be deemed to have acquired jurisdiction to order the improvements to be made, and the Council may thereafter by ordinance provide for making such improvement, which shall conform in all particulars to the plans and specifications previously adopted.

(6) When the improvement of any street is ordered the Recorder, upon instruction from the Common Council, shall immediately invite proposals for making the same, in accordance with ordinance provided, which proposals shall be opened in the presence of a majority of the Common Council and the contract awarded to the lowest responsible bidder for either the whole of said improvement or such part thereof as will not materially conflict with the completion of the remainder thereof. The Common Council shall have the right to reject any or all proposals received. If all proposals shall be rejected the Common Council shall have power by resolution duly adopted, to order that such improvement, or any portion thereof, may be made under the direction of the Common Council by purchasing the materials and hiring the labor therefor. The Common Council shall have the power to provide for the proper inspection and supervision of all work done under the provisions of this article, and to do any other act to secure the faithful carrying out and the completion of all contracts, and the making of all improvements in strict compliance with the ordinances and specifications therefor, and shall have power to direct that the cost of said improvements, or any portion thereof, shall be paid for by the City.

(7) Upon the signing of the contract, or upon the determination of improvements under its own supervision by purchasing the material and the Common Council to make said of ten days in some newspaper to be designated by the Council, and there hiring the labor therefor, or as soon thereafter as is reasonably convenient, the Common Council shall proceed to apportion and assess the cost of making such improvement upon

the lots, parts of lots and parcels of land within the assessment district, in accordance with the special and peculiar benefits derived by each lot, part of lot and parcel of land. No notice of such hearing and assessment shall be necessary other than the notice required by subdivision 1 of this section, and all objections or exceptions to the Surveyor's estimates of percentage or any application for raising or lowering the same in any particular shall be filed with the City Recorder within fifteen days after the first publication of such notice, and at such hearing the Common Council shall consider the said City Surveyor's estimates of assessments and all objections thereto, and shall have the power at its discretion, and without any further notice, to consider, ascertain and determine the amount of the special and peculiar benefits accruing to each lot, part of lot or parcel of land within said assessment district by reason of such improvement, and the amount apportioned by the City Surveyor to any lot, part of lot or parcel of land shall be so reduced or increased by the Common Council that it shall be in just proportion to such benefits. But in no case shall any such percentage exceed such benefit. The amount of such assessment against each lot, part of lot and parcel of land shall be declared by ordinance, and the Recorder shall thereupon enter the same in the lien docket of The City of Pendleton, and the same shall thereafter be known as the Recorder's Estimate and Assessment. The contract price, based upon the estimate of the City Surveyor, or if there be no contract, the estimates of the City Surveyor, the cost of right of way and expenses of condemning the land and a sum not exceeding five per cent of the contract price, or the surveyor's estimate as the cost of advertising, engineering and superintendence shall be deemed to be the cost of every improvement.
