LAST EVENING'S CONCERT IMMENSELY ENJOYED
One of the finest musical events of the season was the recital given in Miss Young's studio last evening by Malen Burnett of the Fischer school of music, Walla Walla, and Mrs. Charlotte Baumeister-Thompson.

Both are artists and it is seldom that a program of such interest and difficulty so well given is heard here.

Mrs. Thompson possesses a voice of rare sweetness and purity of tone and was in excellent voice. Her interpretations and simplicity of manner make it a pleasure to hear her. She was forced to respond to repeated encores.

Miss Burnett, who has spent a good part of her life in Europe, came to teach at the Fischer school of music three years ago and is one of the most successful teachers of the northwest, as well as having earned for herself first rank among the pianists on this coast.

Miss Burnett's technique is clever and crisp. Her interpretations intelligent and artistic and her touch is firm, yet sympathetic.

Her lack of mannerisms make it a joy to watch her as well as listen to her.

The audience was enthusiastic and almost impatient in its demand for encores.
