### QUEEN MARY DOES NOT FAVOR HOBBLE SKIRTS

London, May 10.—Vivien, Lady Decies, the second daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Gould, today won a signal social triumph at the very outset of her career in England by being the first American presented to King George and Queen Mary. The presentation took place today at Buckingham Palace during the course of the first court. Mrs. Whitelaw Reid, wife of the American Ambassador, introduced Lady Decies to Their Majesties, and the girl from Uncle Sam's land curtsied and bowed with as much grace and ease as if she had been accustomed to hobnob with royalty all her short life.

The precedence given to Lady Decies created quite a commotion among the Yankee peeresses, who did not relish the idea of being displaced

by the latest recruit to their ranks. The list of debutantes and brides for presentation at today's court was the longest ever dealt with, and many remained to be presented at the courts to be held May 24 and 25.

White Lady Decies was most cordial to Their Majesties today. It is known that the petted daughter of the Goulds is somewhat "peevish" because Queen Mary has put the ban of her official displeasure on hobble gowns. The gorgeous trossou of "that Gould girl"—as the jealous American noblemen call her—includes numberless costumes with tight skirts and hobble effects. If she bows to the edict of the Queen—and she did today—she will have to abandon a good part of her wardrobe and have new gowns made in the fuller fashions favored by the Queen. Even her wedding gown has had to be remodelled to meet the almost Victorian prudishness of Queen Mary, who falls in a faint at sight of any gown which offers the slightest suggestion that ladies have legs. Friends of Lady Decies say that it will take about a thousand American railroad men a year to pile up enough profits to replace the wardrobe of Her Ladyship with gowns that will please the Queen.

#### Court Inspects Roads.

Judge J. W. Maloney and Commissioners Horace Walker and H. M. Cockburn today finished their tour of the west end of the county for the purpose of inspecting the fifteen proposed roads on the project which have been petitioned for. The petitions will come up at the June meeting of the court. While in the west end, the court also made an investigation of the controversy over the division of the Stanfield school district which will come up for settlement Saturday.

#### Students Banquet Tonight.

At the Christian church this evening the members of the Agricultural club of the high school will give a banquet for themselves, their ladies and a number of invited guests, including the members of the school board and their wives. The banquet will be served in the basement of the church and the rooms are being decorated in the colors of the high school. It is anticipated that about 50 will be present including students and guests. Prof. A. C. Hampton, principal of the high school, will serve as toastmaster.

#### Project Settlers Praised.

The Hermiston country and the people residing therein were highly praised at the meeting of the Commercial club last evening. In the course of the meeting Leon Cohen told of an auto trip to the west end of the county Sunday and of the rapidity with which the project is being settled and developed. Going over the project on a visit to some land owned by Mrs. Cohen he was agreeably surprised at the character of the homes being erected and at the class of people who constitute the settlers of the project. He urged upon others the advantages of keeping in touch with conditions on the Hermiston section.

#### Pictures From Mexico.

Major Lee Moorhouse has just received about twenty films taken in war ridden Mexico which are extremely valuable because of the risk incurred in taking them. They were taken by Miss Edith C. Lane, a magazine writer who has long been a friend of the major's, and were accompanied by a letter in which the writer narrates the difficulty encountered in securing the films. She and her mother have been in El Paso for some time and several days ago they made an excursion over the border into Juarez which is one of the principal seats of warfare. While she was snapping her camera on the rudely constructed fortifications which barricaded the streets, she was surprised by Mexican soldiers and only her sex and the fact that she encountered a friend saved her from arrest and imprisonment. One of the films was of General Orozco who is a personal friend of Miss Lane. The major values the films greatly and will immediately make prints off of them.

#### IRELAND OPPOSES THE ENGLISH-AMERICAN TREATY

Dublin, May 10.—The opposition of a large part of Irish people to the proposed English-American treaty took definite form today when four delegates representing each Irish province set sail for New York for the purpose of urging the Irish-American societies to oppose the treaty. The Irish nationalist party it is said opposes the treaty but fears to declare itself for fear of injuring the cause of home rule.

#### WEALTHY SEATTLE WIDOW TAKES HER OWN LIFE

Seattle, May 10.—After crying over a magazine poem, Mrs. Katherine Matthews, aged 32, a wealthy divorcee, went into her bathroom in a fashionable Belgravia apartment, and suicide by taking carbolic acid. Her estate is worth \$60,000 and is left to her daughter, Mrs. Marie Thomas of Gasto. It is reported that Mrs. Matthews grieved over the recent suicide of an old friend whose identity is unknown.

Amendment authorizing council to provide sinking funds for all bonds issued to loan the same on real estate security:

First Ward—Yes, 79; no, 27.

Amendment exempting bonds from taxation and providing amount of bonds issued shall not be included in computing the authorized indebtedness of the city:

but as yet no answer has been received.

Upon receipt of the answer to the first telegram, Coroner Folsom investigated the man's personal effects for some means of identification and, among them, found a letter, addressed to Mrs. Albert O. Erwin, written some time ago but which had never been sent.

#### A Pathetic Letter.

The letter was couched in perfect English and showed evidences of education and refinement. In it he referred repeatedly to his past life and to the disgrace which he had brought upon his family. He expressed an intention of leaving soon for the southwest, where he hoped to find, in new scenes and associates, a refuge from the past which relentlessly pursued him and an assuaging balm for the pains which an avenging memory visited upon him. This seemed an almost hopeless quest for him, however, for in the next sentence, he stated his despair of ever finding peace this side of the portals of the grave. He spoke several times of Mary and it would seem that she was the wife of his earlier days.

The body is being held here until further communication from his sister, when, it is probable, that it will be shipped to California to find a last resting place among scenes which he would not revisit while alive.
