WOOL MARKET IS BECOMING FIRMER

PRICE IS OFF BUT
SHOWS IMPROVEMENT

Many Echo Growers Dispose of Clips Without Waiting for Sales Days—Heavy Sales of Yearlings Recently Made.

Though wool is still selling at prices considerably below those of last year there is a strengthening of the market as compared with its condition at the opening of the season. A number of clips sold at Echo recently brought prices ranging from eight and a half cents to 13 1-2 and these prices according to R. N. Stanfield are about four cents per pound lower than those given a year ago. It is worthy of note that the buyers are anxious to obtain wool at the prices they are offering.

Among the Echo clips sold thus far are the M. S. Corrigal clip, the Hubbard clip, and the clip of Pedro Bros. Most of this wool has been purchased by C. W. Ryder. The Stanfield wool has not yet been sold. Among the Echo buyers there is a tendency to sell their clips individually without waiting for the sales days.

Many sheep sales have also occurred in the Echo country recently. Most of the sheep sold are yearlings and were disposed of by the growers after having been sheared. R. F. Bicknell has been a heavy buyer and he has been paying from \$1.75 to \$2.50 per head for yearlings. Aged ewes have sold from \$1.25 to \$2 and two year old wethers have gone at prices from \$2 to \$2.10. Among those who have sold sheep are Anton Vey, M. S. Corrigal, J. Keeney, Hynd Bros., and Messrs. Wigglesworth, Chapman and Pat Dogherty.

There is nothing particular significant in these sales, according to R. N. Stanfield. The Echo growers are not reducing their flocks but are merely making sales that are usually made at this time of the year when lambs are not sold in the fall.

Quarter Section for \$11,000.

Deputy Sheriff George Strand returned on the Northern Pacific train this morning from Pasco with Frank Weber arrested for passing a bad check on Tom Swering, proprietor of the French restaurant.

Sues to Collect Note.

The Farmers' Bank of Weston vs. J. K. Bartlett is the title of a suit filed today in the local court in which the plaintiff seeks to collect a balance of \$125.50 alleged to be due on a promissory note executed by the defendant. Judge James A. Fee is attorney for the plaintiff.

Shoe Thieves to Baker.

The two men arrested last week by Chief Gurdane when trying to dispose of a quantity of shoes in their possession, will probably be taken to Baker for trial. Detective E. B. Wood was in the city this morning and thinks he has connected the men up with a recent robbery in Baker county.

Harold Warner an Actor.

Harold Warner, formerly a well known high school student, has made his debut as a Thespian at the University of Oregon, where he is a sophomore. In the play "At Yale," which was presented in Eugene Thursday night, he took one of the leading roles and in speaking of his efforts on the stage the Eugene Register declares he has wonderful acting ability.

Three Drunks in Court.

Following a day of idleness, the wheels of the local police court were again started this morning on a small grist. Three drunks were dumped into the hopper, two paying fines of five dollars and the other accepting a term of three days in limbo. The fined men were James Brink and Michael Carmon and the jailed member of the trio Tom Multhers.

Tomorrow Is Mothers' Day.

"Tomorrow is Mothers' Day" in the state of Oregon and Governor West has issued a proclamation asking for a universal observance of the occasion. He asks that the white carnation be worn by all in recognition of the purity, beauty, love, charity and fidelity of motherhood and requests that flags be flown from all public buildings. This is the day, too, when all absent sons should send a letter to their mother.

Stanfield School Fight On.

The county boundary board, consisting of the members of the county court and the school superintendent, is this afternoon hearing the petitioners for the remonstrators against the division of the school district at Stanfield. There is considerable feeling aroused over the proposed division and the matter is being fought out today. The county court, during its recent tour of the west end, made an investigation of conditions while at Stanfield.

Irrigation Company Sued.

F. W. Paine and J. C. Paine, two stockholders in the Milton Freewater and Hudson Bay Irrigation company, have commenced suit in the local equity court against that corporation to restrain the Board of Trustees from selling any more perpetual water rights at \$3 per acre and to have a receiver appointed to take charge of the company's property. They allege that the board has been selling these water rights at \$3 without the consent of the stockholders and that the rights are worth \$50.

Back From Middle States.

J. J. Kelley, owner and publisher of the Evening Bulletin of Walla Walla, was a visitor here during the afternoon yesterday while enroute home after a trip to the middle west. Mr. Kelley was east for the purpose of investigating with a view to purchasing a new press for the Bulletin. He says that the crop outlook through the middle states is very fair this year but that a business depression is noticeable there as well as upon the coast. He thinks this is due in part to the political unrest now apparent throughout the country.

To Observe Decoration Day.

Malabon Camp of the Spanish-American War Veterans has taken the first step toward observing Decoration Day, May 30. At the last meeting, a committee consisting of J. D. Boyd, John Kearney and A. O. Carden was appointed to confer with the local G. A. R. and company L for the purpose of arranging to honor the nation's dead. At the same meeting N. South Ankeny was chosen delegate to the annual encampment which will be held at Portland, June 7. J. D. Boyd being chosen as alternate.

Was Wanted Here Also.

Delbert Hanks alias Frank Howard alias Robert Robert E. Holt, the man arrested at Roseburg for forgery in different parts of the United States and upon whom a Stanfield bank check book was found, is the same man who attempted to cash a \$6000 bogus draft at Stanfield some time ago, according to local officers.

MANY HEAR EX-GOVERNOR FOLK

ing. I have heard men deplore the exposure of public corruption because it hurts a city; I have seen men oppose the enforcement of law against gambling and liquor lawlessness because it injures the state; I have heard men object to prosecuting trusts and monopolies because it hurts business. Such views are entirely false. No city can be injured by the enforcement of the people's laws; to do otherwise is to substitute the will of the official for the laws of the people, and that is tyranny. No state can be hurt by opposing grafting; to do otherwise is to connive at it. There is no secret remedy known for evils of this character. They cannot be cured by hiding them. The disgrace is not in their correction, but in submission to them with supine indifference.

A False Argument.

It is well for a state to display its virtues and not parade its faults, but it should not be forgotten that the highest civic virtue is in the overthrow of civic depravity. Grafters, whether in St. Louis, Philadelphia, Chicago, San Francisco or Pittsburgh, always endeavor to have it appear that a fight against them is a slander against the city in which they operate. Criminal wealth when assailed always tries to hide behind the skirts of legitimate business, and claims that business is being attacked. According to their argument grafters should never be assailed lest some assume that all in the city are grafters, and lawlessness in business should never be fought lest it be suspected that all business is lawless.

Patriotism of Peace.

In the work before you there is no use for the sword, but there is a stern demand for that courage shown in Americans on so many battlefields. The spirit they exhibited as soldiers of war, we should show as soldiers of peace in the noblest work to which the patriot can be called—the supreme and sublime effort to bring a little nearer day by day, the time when brotherhood and charity shall rule instead of avarice and greed; when special privilege in every form shall be destroyed and equal rights to all enthroned as the ruling principle of public and the guiding principle of private life.

Government by Few.

The most conspicuous fault of national, state and municipal governments in the United States today is that they are governments by the few and not by the people. There has been improvement in the last few years, but there remains much to be done in the direction of better things. There is too much aggressive selfishness and avarice, and too little aggressive patriotism. If the patriotism could be made as aggressive as the rottenness the problem of good government everywhere would be solved by the people taking the government in their own hands. If corruption exists anywhere the people are to blame. If corruption is to be eradicated the people alone can do it. What is needed is more of the patriotism that fights for city, state and country every day; the kind of patriotism that will go into battles of peace as readily as into battles of war.

Law Abiders Inactive.

If a government anywhere neglects the people it is because the people first neglect the government. The law abiding people are in the majority, and there is hardly a community in the country of which this cannot be said. They are usually quiet though while the lawless are so vociferous as to deceive many as to their number. A majority of the people are honest, and want good government, but do not as a rule, work for it, while the minority are perniciously active all the time. The lawless stand on the street and talk for their side, while the law abiding are timid and unobtrusive. A dozen law breakers can make more noise than five hundred law abiding citizens, but they do not count for much against the united efforts of the law abiding. They are always active, however, while the average good citizen becomes active only occasionally. They surround an official and sing him the siren song of the good politics of serving them instead of the public. It is always easier for an official to serve the "gang" instead of the people. Unless the official be strong he will be led astray by their alluring promises.

No Necessary Evils.

There are no "necessary evils" in government. It is the abuse of government about which all good citizens have a right to complain. Those who have profited by the abuses are usually the loudest in the denunciation of those who point out abuses in public affairs.

While the people are to blame where public abuses exist, officials who wink at the violation of the law are nevertheless culpable. Good government depends more upon the man be-

hind the law than upon the law itself. The law is merely the weapons for officials to use, and without officials laws would be as useless as cannon in war without men. When an official takes an oath to enforce the law, he has no right to violate the oath and excuse the non-enforcement of certain laws because they are, or seem to be unpopular. Sentiment may be against the enforcement of some law, but an official does not take an oath to support public sentiment, he does take an oath to uphold the law. Public sentiment is a difficult thing to ascertain. Law abiding people are quiet while the lawless are so vociferous as to deceive by their clamor the facts as to the number. The only correct way to determine public sentiment is to be guided by the expression of the people's will through the law making body. When a law is passed it must be assumed it is what the people want, and it should be enforced until the people demand and secure its repeal. What may seem to be public sentiment is often the clamor of the lawless who have a selfish interest in violating the law.

Vigilance is Needed.

Civic evils cannot exist where the public conscience is aroused. Nearly all public wrongs grow out of the indifference of the people. The exposures recently brought about in different places would have come years ago if the people had been aroused to a true understanding of the situation. Had the people been alert, and had they taken as much interest in municipal affairs as they would have taken in a corporation in which they were stockholders the disgraceful conditions would never have existed. Much has been done for good government during the past few years. But we should not be content with what has been accomplished in the fight against public evils. There is plenty of work yet to be done. States,

like men, should never be satisfied, but should ever strive for higher development. The man who is so self satisfied as to pronounce himself undesirable of further improvement is likely to be most in need of advancement. The future of our government rests upon the integrity of the citizens, and upon his activity in public affairs. Good government must begin at home, in cities and towns and proceed from there to state and nation. This government rests not on the wealth of a few, but upon the character and integrity of the average individual.
