CAMP IS MOVED FROM COYOTE TO HERMISTON

Hermiston, Ore., May 15.—The main corps of the government civil engineers, who have been doing the surveying on the proposed western extension of the Umatilla government project have moved their camp from down near Coyote to within a few miles of the town of Hermiston, and it is supposed that they will now take the topography of the high lands.

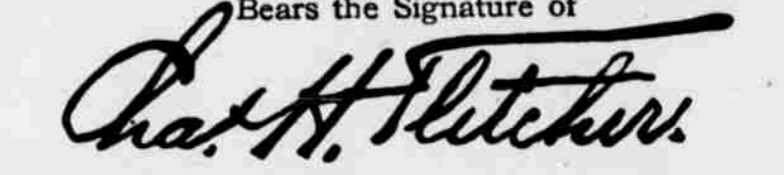
