

HOGS ARE DOWN TEN CENTS AT PORTLAND

TOP REACHED \$6.65 ON MARKET YESTERDAY

Estimated That Only 1,500,000 to 2,000,000 Bushels of Wheat Remain in Oregon, Idaho and Washington.

(From Monday's Journal.)
 In the Stockyards.
 North Portland—Hogs lower; cattle steady, sheep steady to easy.
 South Omaha—Hogs 5c lower; cattle slow and lower; sheep steady to 10c higher.
 Chicago—Hogs 5c lower; cattle lower; sheep steady.

While prices are nominally the same in the Portland livestock market there is an easier to weaker tone in the sheep trade and with greater offerings the expectations are for lower prices.

Interior sheep interests seem to be afraid of an impending break in values here for they are shipping additional supplies to the Omaha sheep and lamb trade and prices there today are generally 10c higher with yearlings at \$4.65 to \$5.25, wethers \$4.15 to \$4.75 and lambs \$5 to \$9.

Cattle Market Steady.
 There were 10 loads of cattle in from Montana today and these sold at \$6.75 with the average weight 1045 1-2 pounds. The cattle market continues on the basis of 7 for first class steers. Arrivals of grass stuff from the south are anxiously awaited by buyers but as it will be some days before the regular movement starts, killers are forced to pay previous prices for their immediate wants.

The run of cattle at North Portland today totaled 276 head and all but a few were from Anaconda.

Hogs Are Lower Again.
 While there was a drop of a nickel in the price of hogs at South Omaha today, it still costs \$7.15 to land supplies here and the best price that the local trade is offering is \$6.65 or 10c less than the low market of last week. Therefore purchases of hogs in the east cost 50c more than killers are willing to pay local producers.

At Chicago there was a weaker tone in the swine trade today and values were down 5c with the top at \$6.20. The drop in Chicago today is due to the immense run of 40,000 head over Sunday.

The Wheat Market.
 According to an estimate made this morning by a prominent wheat buying firm, only 1,500,000 to 2,000,000

bushels of wheat remain in all hands in the states of Oregon, Idaho and Washington.

Stocks of wheat in all hands are extremely small. Most of the remaining holdings are in very tight hands, although only a few big lots are shown anywhere.

The biggest lot is in the Walla Walla country, one interest holding 110,000 bushels, while a second interest holds 30,000 bushels. Other lots scattered throughout the inland empire are of very small size.

The big lots at Walla Walla are said to be held for several cents advance over the present market.

While there was weakness abroad today on account of more favorable weather for the growing crop in Russia, the local trade is holding very firm. Sales of small lots of club are reported on the basis of 86c to 78c with bluestem at 93 @ 94c a bushel track delivery.

California continues to take on club, bluestem and Turkey red and buyers for that account are offering the extreme top.

California wheat crop prospects are said to be extremely poor on account of the overabundance of rains. Coarse grain markets are firm bit quiet.
