HOGS ADVANCE TEN CENTS AT PORTLAND

FANCY FED STEERS SELL FOR SEVEN DOLLARS

Fight is About to be Started for the Control of the Wheat Grown in Central Oregon—Market is Quiet.

(From Thursday's Journal.)

An advance of a dime was forced in the price of hogs at North Portland for an extra fancy lot of light stuff.

The market for swine opened rather firm here this morning on account of the recent advance in the east and 65 head that averaged 175 pounds went at the \$6.75 mark.

Receipts of hogs were light in the swine trade today although considering the fact that the run was from local points, the showing was about as good as has been seen here recently.

At South Omaha there was a cut of a nickel in the hog market with tops at \$6.95 and the low market at \$6.75. This means \$7.15 to land at Portland or 40c above the advanced price paid here this morning.

At Chicago hogs dropped a like amount as at South Omaha with tops at \$6.30.

Fancy fed steers sold up to \$7 in the Portland yards today and this price was obtainable for several loads.

There was a fairly good run of good stuff in the yards this morning and the strength of the market was attested by the eagerness of packers to take hold at previous high figures.

According to an advice sent to J. C. Lohrman at the stockyards by E. E. Willard from Porterville, Cal., the cattle there are about a month backward in growth and a good movement can scarcely be expected in this direction before June 1. A small lot is expected here from the Sacramento section about May 25.

Sheep and Lambs Holding.

Weakness in the sheep and lamb trade here has not been sufficient to cause any further depression in prices and sales made this morning were generally on the basis of prices that have been in effect for several days.

There was only a small run of sheep in the yards this morning. The lot consisted of ewes that averaged 94 pounds. The sale was made at \$4.25.

At South Omaha there was a further improvement in the sheep and lamb trade and prices were advanced 5c with yearlings \$4.50@5.00, 8-weekers \$4.25@4.50, lambs \$6.50@8.00, and ewes \$4.00@4.40. These values are generally a fraction above those in effect here.

Fight for Wheat.

A fight for control of the wheat grown in central Oregon is about to start. Several warehouses are already started along the lines of the new railroads and it is the intention of several firms to own strings of warehouses in that section.

All present expectations are that there will be a greater output of grain in central Oregon within a few years than the entire state of Oregon produces at this time. The acreage there is said to be increased this year, but the amount is small compared to what is expected within the next two years after the railroads really penetrate the interior.

Wheat market is quiet locally. Prices are being maintained on a nominal basis, with neither buyers nor sellers showing a desire to hurry transactions.

Flour market is firm with prices unchanged for patent. Full prices are being realized for export. It is stated that a number of good sized orders have come to Puget sound mills during the past few days, although none have been received here.

Coarse grains are firm but unchanged.
