NEBRASKA CATTLE IN PORTLAND YARDS

SHEEP AND LAMBS CONTINUE LOWER

Nebraska Shipment Is In Good Condition—Brought in by Meat Concerns—Valley Holders Ask \$30 Per Ton for White Oats.

In the Stockyards, North Portland—Hogs firm; cattle steady; sheep 10 to 15c lower. South Omaha—Hogs 5 to 10c lower; cattle steady; sheep steady to strong. Chicago—Hogs 5c lower; cattle steady; sheep steady.

Cattle from Nebraska were in the local yards today, these being the first arrivals of any consequence from that section to this market. The shipment was said to be in good condition. The quality was so good that it was reported in the yards that the Frank L. Smith Meat company, the shippers, were to offer the best stuff to other killers.

This is the first time that cattle have ever been brought here from Nebraska for the market. Some time ago the Union Meat company brought in a load of steers to show the people here how much better the eastern stuff is than the local product, but the experiment proved a failure because the shipment cost too much to land here and the quality could have just as readily been secured from local ranches.

The fact that the Smith company has brought in cattle from Nebraska gives the impression that the concern cannot secure shipments here. This, however, is denied by interests at the yards.

Hogs from Nebraska, Too. There were 11 loads of hogs from Nebraska today. The Smith company brought forward two loads, while nine loads went to the Union Meat company through the regular commission houses.

The market for hogs was firm in the yards today. Good light stock sold at \$6.75, the same price as yesterday, while one lot of China rats went at \$7.35. Demand for the latter is so limited that this can scarcely be called a market factor.

At Chicago there was further depression in the swine trade today and the price closed a nickel under the cut value of yesterday. At South Omaha the swine trade was under pressure with arrivals of 10,500 head for the day. Prices dropped from 5c to 10c to \$5.75@5.95, making the landing cost of Nebraska swine here \$7.05 or 20c above the present market at North Portland.

Sheep and Lambs Lower. North Portland prices for sheep and lambs are about 15c lower than previous values, although best wethers are still selling as high as \$4.75 or 15c below former prices.

Lambs sold this morning for \$6.50 to 6.60, and the higher price could scarcely be obtained. The outlook for sheep and lamb prices is not nearly so good here. The movement is much heavier than formerly, a total of 1565 head being received in the yards during the past 24 hours.

At South Omaha the sheep and lamb market was steady to strong today with yearlings at \$4.50 to \$5; wethers, \$4.25 to \$4.50; lambs, \$6.50 to \$8, and ewes from \$4 to \$4.40.

Wheat Firmer. Holders of oats at Willamette valley points are generally holding out for \$30 a ton Portland delivery, but are not receiving this price so far as can be ascertained.

While some dealers say they are unable to purchase No. 1 white oats under \$29.50, others say they are offered plenty of this variety at \$29, but are in no hurry to take hold.

Stocks of oats at interior points are so limited that only a nominal number of cars are available for this loading and it would cost \$20 to land supplies here.

Wheat market is firm but very quiet. Some dealers are advancing their bids on club from 1-2 to 1c a
