LIVESTOCK MARKET CONTINUES WEAK

FIRST GRASS CATTLE ARRIVE AT PORTLAND

Fifteen Loads Come Into Yards and Help to Depress the General Condition—Hog Market is not so Good as Last Week.

(From Tuesday's Journal.)

Two loads of the best offerings of grass cattle today brought \$6.65 this afternoon at North Portland while the cutouts sold at \$6 to \$6.25. The lot was not weighed until late in the afternoon. The best stuff averaged about 1175 pounds.

The first grass cattle of the season came forward into the local yards in good condition today. The shipment was from Gault, Cal., and consisted of 15 loads.

The cattle market in general is lower and prices are down from 15 to 25c from yesterday, with a much weaker feeling existing, as a result of the heavier shipments to North Portland.

On account of the more favorable market that has ruled here than at eastern and middle west centers, Montana continues to unload huge supplies on the Portland trade. There were further receipts of 5 loads from there today.

Only supplies have not been the huge case of the drop in prices here. The formal opening of the grass cattle season has perhaps added more weight to values than any other cause.

As long as packers can get grass stuff of quality, they will offer little more for better feed stuff and therefore the price of hay cattle is made to conform to the price available for grass stock.

Yesterday's huge arrivals of cattle were not cleaned up at the time and quite a number of loads were carried over until this morning owing to the lack of buyers.

Hog Market Easier.

While the receipts of hogs in the North Portland yards today consisted principally of China fats, the general trend of the trade was not so good as last week. This change in condition is due to the added weakness in the eastern prices. At South Omaha there was a further loss of a nickel today which placed the tops there at \$5.70 or \$6.80 to land here. This places the local price at about what it cost to bring in the Missouri river stock.

At Chicago the hog market was steady today with no general change in quotations.

Wheat is Quiet.

There is a very quiet but firm tone in the wheat trade locally. Nothing further has been heard by the trade regarding the mysterious nibbling for a shipload, which was supposed to be either for the orient or Mexico.

While some liberal purchases have been reported in the interior, coast-wise business is small on account of the limited offerings. Prices here remain generally as previously quoted.

Regarding the sale of a big lot at Walla Walla recently, the Evening

Bulletin of that city says:

"One of the largest sales of wheat made here in months was made yesterday when R. J. Thompkins sold 43,000 bushels, or 42 carloads of bluestem to a Puget sound concern, the real being handled through the Farmers' Grain agency. The figure was not given out but is understood to be about 85 cents f. o. b.

The grain was raised on Eureka flat and was strictly No. 1. Mr. Thompkins has held fully half the grain two years, and might have sold the wheat time and again for a far better price than he received. A year ago last December bluestem sold here for more than \$1 a bushel.

With the sale of this large lot of grain there remains but one other large lot in the county. This is on Eureka flat and is owned by Mr. Welch. He and his renter have nearly 100,000 bushels of bluestem, both their 1909 and 1910 crops. They may hold their grain over another year. There are few lots of grain in which there are more than 10,000 bushels. Nearly all of the holdover wheat is stored on the flat.
