

LIVESTOCK MARKET IS IN BAD SHAPE

OVERCROWDING TRADE KEEPS PRICE DOWN

One Half Cent a Bushel is Added to Price of Wheat at Portland—Northern and California Millers Enter the Market for Supplies.

Cattle market prices here are being submerged by the enormous arrivals of the past few days and the tendency to ship more from outside points.

A trainload of cattle is awaiting orders at Merced, Cal., to proceed to Portland, but the latest slump in prices is expected to have its effect, and

the order to move will probably be delayed for a while. Nevertheless there are other cattle coming forward from the outside that will continue to give the trade here its most bearish tinge. A big lot of Colorado cattle is expected in the North Portland yards late in the day and will add to the accumulated holdings already shown there.

Buyers are extremely bearish in their views regarding the market, and now that they have the chance, prices are being slashed right and left. Within the space of a few days cattle market prices have lost 50c, with further weakness showing.

While a sale of California stuff was made late yesterday at \$6.65 and reported in last night's Journal, the top of the market today is generally believed to be \$6.50 or 15c down.

The cattle situation is showing one of those extremes seldom witnessed and therefore it seems small wonder that a further severe reduction has not been made in the price. With fed cattle still coming forward in very large numbers and with the formal opening of the grass season, the two extremes of values are meeting at this time, and naturally prices are suffering.

Those that have fed cattle to sell are naturally desirous of obtaining more money for their goods, and some of the shippers are not inclined to pay the low prices offered. They seem of the opinion that the market will do better after awhile, but this view is not shared by the cattle trade generally, and buyers are getting more bearish every day.

The bringing in of dressed meats from Omaha by Armour & Co., has been a very bearish influence in the local trade. Thus far this week two cars of Omaha dressed beef have been received here and these will complete with the local trade. On account of not being regularly established in the dressed beef trade here, it is extremely unlikely that Armour can or will demand the top for the eastern supplies, therefore this has its effect toward lowering dressed meat prices generally.

According to Manager Herren of Armour & Co., it is not likely that further shipments will be brought forward to Portland at this time owing to the expectations of warmer weather which would make it impracticable to ship dressed beef such a long distance. The chances of loss are said to be too great to continue the shipments.

Along with the dressed beef being brought out from the Omaha market by Armour, a local meat company is bringing in supplies of live cattle from the Missouri river territory. The firm is said to have quite buying in the yards recently.

Several small deals have again been reported at interior points for elevator account. Both California and northwestern millers are again in the market for bluestem and club and this is giving the trade a firmer basis.

Course grain markets remain stationary with little business developing during the past 24 hours. This is more especially true of barley, of which only nominal holdings remain in this territory. Holding of oats in the Willamette valley are fair and some growers are allowing small lots to enter the market. Eastern Oregon and Washington oats are firmer at interior points and few shipments are coming in this direction.
