AMERICAN SYNDICATE BUYS B. C. TIMBER

Nelson, B. C.—The deal has just been completed whereby an American syndicate, with which is associated F. C. Adams of Portland, Ore., and Charles A. Barnum of Revelstoke, obtains control of at least 700,000 miles timber and pulpwood acres in the interior, with almost all the available lots and lands adjacent.

It is the intention of this syndicate to erect a large pulp and paper mill in Revelstoke, which supply the energy for driving all the machinery. Here the large dam will be constructed with a lock permitting steamers to pass through the river and a spillway for logs.

Two million dollars is the initial capital arranged. The combined enterprises will employ many hundreds

of men.

As a feature of this industrial development the installation of a street railway system by the Dominion Security company in Revelstoke and other plants for the improvement of city property are contemplated.

Charles A. Barnum manager of the Diamond Mills company, limited, and secretary and manager of the Dominion Security company, engineered the deal and is now in Winnipeg making arrangements for a publicity campaign.

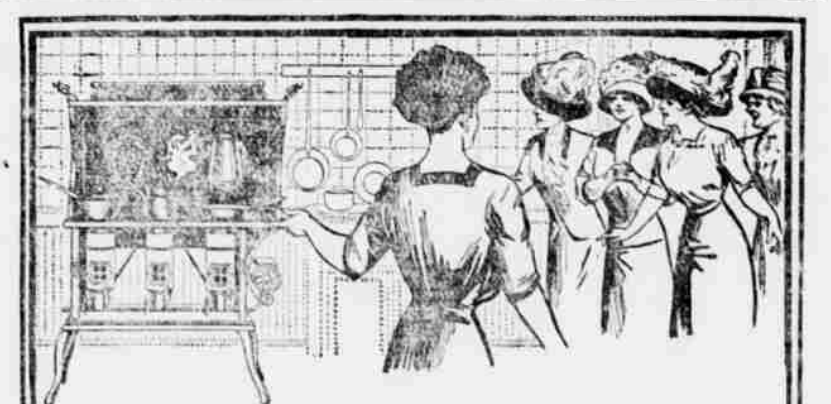
