

# CATTLE MARKET IS IN POOR CONDITION

## LACK OF DEMAND CAUSES LOW PRICES

Best Grass Stuff Sells at \$6.40 or 15 Cents Lower—Nominal Amount of Old Wheat is Held in Section.

(From Thursday's Journal.)

Only two loads of livestock appeared in the North Portland yards today and this gave receivers a chance to clean up previous arrivals. The market for cattle is generally unchanged since the drop of about 20c yesterday. One lot of top grain fed steers sold at \$6.50 this morning, or fully 40c under what the same class of stuff would have brought here a short time ago. This was the only offering in the fed line and hereafter shipments will con-

slat principally of grass stock. The market for grass cattle stands no higher at \$6.40, or a decline of 15c from the first sale of the season the previous day. The market is in poor shape for livestock arrivals and it seems to be the general opinion of commission handlers that it would serve the best interests of all to keep stuff at home until a demand appears.

Whenever there is an improvement in the situation it will be fully explained in The Journal as well as by commission handlers who are watching the market with much concern at this time.

With only a handful of swine in the North Portland yards during the past 24 hours the tone of the market has been held steady with top light stuff selling up to \$6.75. This morning's arrivals of 28 head went at that figure.

**Sheep and Lambs Steady.**

While there was no run of sheep and lambs in the local yards today, some of the stock received yesterday was not sold until a late hour and is therefore reported for the first time today. Sales of top lambs are still reported as high as \$6.50 but the market is gathering weakness and a lower value is generally anticipated by the commission trade at North Portland. The sheep market as a whole is about 25c lower than at the start of the week.

At Chicago the sheep market was reported strong today with no change in quotations. At South Omaha the market developed sudden weakness, although the offerings were light. A loss of 15 to 20c is showing in the Omaha price as compared with yesterday's transactions.

**The Wheat Market.**

Latest corrected statistics gathered by reliable buyers indicate that there will be a famine of old wheat in the Pacific northwest before the new crop is available.

It is now estimated that fractionally less than 750,000 bushels remain in the Big Bend and about 73,000 bushels in the Walla Walla country. The total holdings in Oregon, Washington and Idaho are about 1,500,000 bushels. None remain in Idaho or in Whitman county, Washington, and only a nominal amount in Oregon.

The grinding of old wheat usually extends until September but with such a small amount of cereal available it is evident that grinding of new growth will be started before the grain is really ready for the mills.

While there are quite liberal holdings of patent flour in the hands of the big millers, total holdings in the northwest are far below what had been generally forecasted. For that reason the market is gaining strength and there is again considerable talk of an advance in prices soon.

General cereal situation is firm.

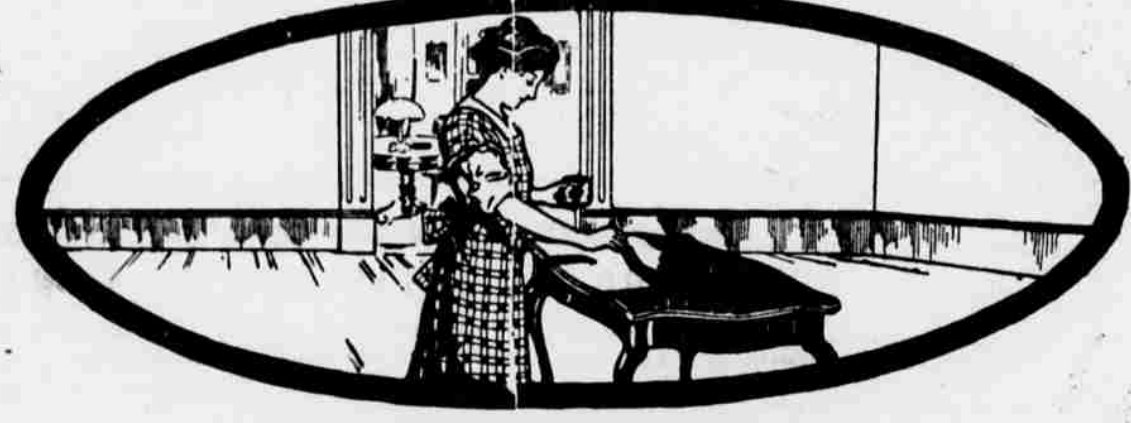
