V., May 29.—In commemoration of the first land engagement of the civil war, which occurred at Phillipi, in Barbour county, Va., now West Virginia, on the morning of the third of June, 1861, a semi-centennial reunion of the veterans of both the blue and the gray was commenced here today and will extend through the week. A reunion of Union and Confederate veterans will be held tomorrow. Many men of prominence have been invited to speak here during the week, including President Taft, Theodore Roosevelt, Speaker Champ Clark, William J. Bryan, Congressman Richmond Pearson Hobson and Governor Glascock of this state.

**BRITISH TOURNAMENT COMMENCES TODAY**  
London, May 29.—With Charles E. (Chick) Evans, Jr., of Chicago, representing Uncle Sam, the annual tournament of the British golf championship commenced today on the famous links at Prestwick. Although pitted against the best amateur golfers of England and of Scotland, the home of the royal game, Evans is confident that he will make a good showing if he does not fulfill the hope expressed by President Taft that he capture the British title for America. Evans captured the United North and South championship at the April tournament in Pinehurst, N. C., where he played against the best amateurs and professionals of the United States. **AID VANCOUVER STRIKERS.**  
Trades and Labor Council Threatens Builders. Vancouver, B. C., May 27.—The executive committee of the Trades and

Labor council, the Building Trades council and the business agents' board tonight adopted a resolution recommending calling a general strike June 5 to compel the master builders' association to make terms with their employees, who have been on strike for a month. The recommendations contained in the resolution will be placed before the Trades and Labor council tomorrow night, when the final action will be taken. Fifty-two unions are affiliated with the Trades and Labor council, and if a general strike is called 8500 men, representing every branch of industry in the city will be affected.

**GROCERS TO RAISE BIG FUND.**  
Association to Levy \$60,000 Annually. Indianapolis.—A plan by which \$60,000 a year will be raised in the membership of the National Wholesale Grocers' association to carry out its purpose, was adopted by the association convention here recently. Members will be assessed for dues annually on a commercial rating basis of \$25 for each \$50,000 invested in the business. President Drake of Easton, Pa., said the association officers had been unable to convince the department of justice that it did not exist in restraint of trade.
