### EXPECTS DECISION IN TOBACCO CASE TODAY

Washington, May 29 .- After a 1eess since May 15, when the Standard Oil decision was made public, the United States supreme court convened today to announce additional opin-l W. ions. This is the last lecision day of the term, so verdicts are expected in several cases, most important which is the government's dissolution sult against the American Tobaccocompa ny,char gedwitn

bacco company, charged with violation of the anti-trust law. Cases in which decisions are not announced today will go over to October. If dectsions are adverse, motions for rehearing would also be carried over to autumn. There would be little hope of getting a rehearing of such a carefully considered suit as that against the "tobacco trust," but the motion would give the corporation all summer and much of the autumn to

reorganize. Decisions as to dates for rehearing of important cases at the October term will' be announced today. Attorneys for the states of Minnesota, Oregon and Missouri have appealed tors as well as tried various patent to the court for an early hearing in the railroad rate injunction cases, and it is likely that these cases will be given precedence in the calendar.

The Minnesota case is regarded a highly important, because all the important questions as to proper valuation and the income to which railroad stockholders are entitled, the relative cost of doing interstate and intrastate business, and the interference with which interstate commerce were all decided against the state by Judge Sanborn. The Missouri case was also decided against the state by Judge McPherson, on account of the alleged higher cost of doing intrastate business, although he rejected the argument of the railroads that when the ball was booted, state rates are an interference with nterstate commerce. The Oregon case was decided in favor of the state, The supreme court therefore has a to deal with.
