## MECHANICAL ENGINEERS MEET IN PITTSBURG

Pittsburg, Pa., May 30.—Several hundred delegates were received and registered at the Hotel Schenley today for the sixty-third annual convention of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers. A reception will be held this evening. Carnegie Hall has been engaged for the professional sessions of the meeting, the first of which will be held tomorrow morning.

Between business sessions the visiting engineers will be shown over various great industrial plants in Pittsburg and vicinity. Entertainment features will include a boat excursion up the Monongahela, a ball on Thursday evening and a smoker on Friday night.

The present meeting is the first of the organization to be held in Pittsburg since 1884. The American Society of Mechanical Engineers was founded sixty-three years ago and has a membership of 4000. It is recognized as the foremost body of technical and professional engineers in the world.
