Sale of Estate Approved.

Dayton, Wash.—Judge Miller has confirmed the purchase made by John Blessinger of 160 acres of land belonging to the Johnson estate at auction sale a few weeks ago, for \$5000.

Newport Graduates First Class.

Newport, Ore.—Monday evening the Newport high school held its first graduation exercises. The high school has been established three years, but has had no graduations until this year. The class of two, Miss Hallie George of Newport and Miss Viola Gannon of Toledo, have made good records.

Henry Storm in Mountains.

Dayton, Wash.—John Gillis and W. S. Russell returned from a trip to the mountains and report an unprecedented condition on the mountain trails for this time of the year. Beyond the Wolfe fork of the Touchet, the snowdrifts are piled up from 15 to 20 feet high, the heaviest snow ever reported in this region at this time of the year.

Lewiston People Come by Boat.

The Dalles, Ore.—A large party of Lewiston, Idaho, people will start from their city tomorrow on the Open River Transportation company's steamer and will stop in The Dalles over night, when they arrive here, and continue their trip to Portland where they will attend the Rose Carnival. While they are in this city they will be entertained. Arrangements are being made now by the local business men's association.

Capitol May Get State Water.

Salem, Ore.—Secretary of State Olcott is investigating the possibility of connecting the state house with the state waterworks system at the penitentiary. The state plant pumps water to the asylum in addition to the penitentiary. If a change is made at the state house from the city to the state water system and the latter is developed, \$60 a month can be saved to the state. Secretary Olcott declares in addition to this saving, better water and higher pressure can be had.

Goldendale Dark Two Days.

Goldendale, Wash.—Goldendale was in darkness for two days this week. The coils in the dynamo at the power house burned out and it was necessary to await the arrival of new ones. The plant is working again. At this time it is very necessary to have the current during the day, as the city rock crushing plant is run by electric power and with the present crop working on the roads the plant is kept busy the full 10 hours at full capacity.

Fruit Light at Seilo.

Seilo, Ore.—Fruitmen report a very light crop of small fruits in this vicinity. Gooseberries are scarce on the local market, some growers reporting not more than one-third of a crop. Loganberries will not yield much more than one-third the usual amount. The crop of cherries will also be unusually light. Strawberries on account of the cool weather, are just beginning to ripen. The early varieties were badly damaged by the frost but there will probably be the usual crop of late ones.

Woodmen Hold Picnic.

Woodburn, Ore.—The fourth annual picnic of the Marion county association of the Modern Woodmen of America and Royal Neighbors of America is being held in this city today and is being attended by thousands of people. Salem, Silverton, Aumsville, Monitor, Woodburn, Chemawa, Brooks and Scotts Mills camps are largely represented. Music is by the Aurora and Silverton bands. A parade several blocks in length, in which were floats, camp tents, decorated automobiles and vehicles, proceeded to Schram's grove, where the keys of the city were turned over.

CREATE COMMISSION ON PUBLIC MORALITY

Spokane, Wash.—Commissioner Hayden, head of the department of public safety, announces he soon will submit an ordinance to the city council to create a commission on public morality, composed of five prominent citizens of Spokane, who shall serve without pay. The idea is to conduct a thorough investigation into all matters relating to public morality, to prosecute violations of existing laws and to recommend new legislation, if needed. A secretary is to be engaged and permanent offices maintained in the city hall. The plan, which is to be put into operation early in 1912, has the support of Mayor Hindley and two of the other three commissioners. Mr. Hayden believes it will go a long way toward solving the social evil, saloon, public park, amusement and kindred problems in this city. Mayor Hindley has offered a position as sanitary official to a candidate to be decided upon by the Woman's Club of Spokane. The appointee, it is announced, will be vested with police power and have charge of cafe and restaurant inspection.

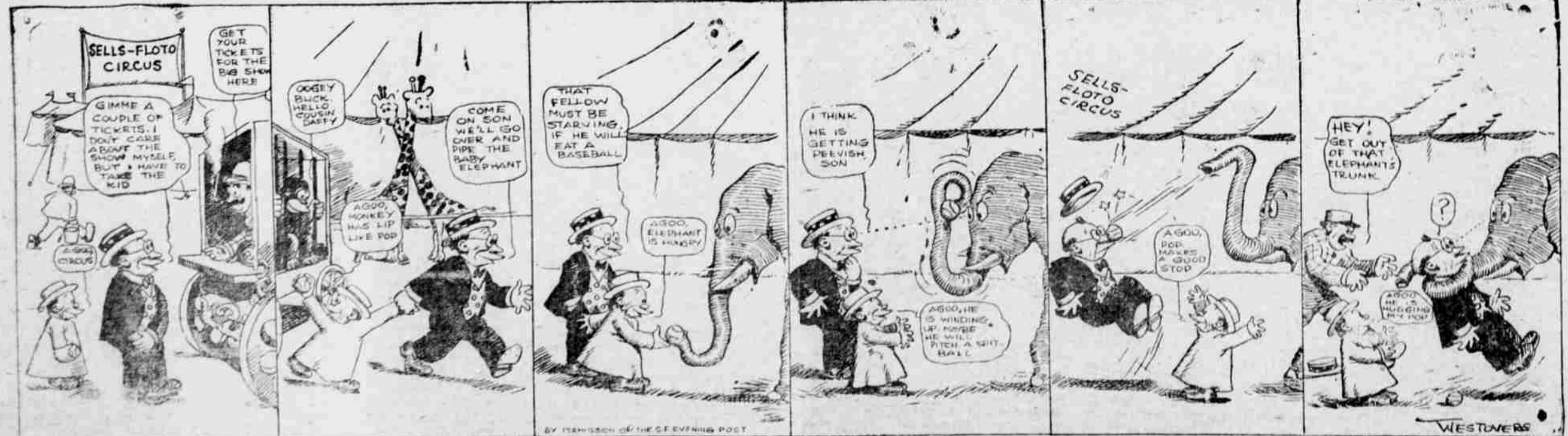
