CHICKENS FOR CONVICTS.

Kansas Warden Goes Into the Poultry Business on Large Scale.

Lansing, Mich.—Poultry raisers all over the state are watching the experiments of Warden J. K. Coddling here, who has engaged in the chicken business on a wholesale plan. The

warden has detailed one man to look after the business. His idea was to get eggs enough for the hospital and chickens for the patients, but it looks now as if he would have chickens for the Christmas dinner for all of the 900 convicts.

When the chicken "trust" fills the incubators with eggs he at the same time sets three or four hens, and as the chickens are hatched in the incubator he gives them to the hens. In this way he does not need any brooders.

One of Warden Coddling's hens is taking care of seventy-five little

chicks. This is a new idea in chicken raising, but it seems to be a good one. The chickens appear to do better with an old hen than in a brooder. People who are extensively engaged in chicken raising in the state are watching this plan and numerous families in Leavenworth are trying it.
