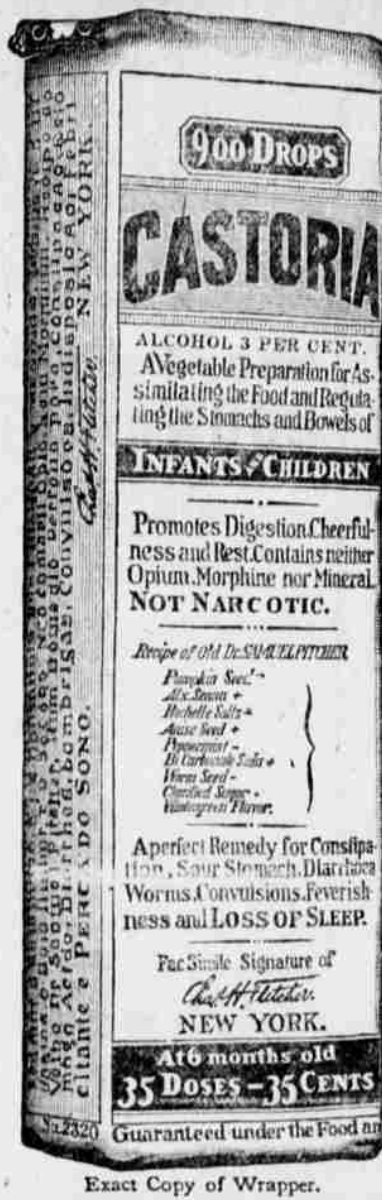

GOSSIP OF GOTHAM.

New York.—If there is in this world any office unstable, uncertain and lacking in permanency, it is that of police commissioner of New York. Compared with that job, a newspaper reporter of a Central American president has a cinch of the variety commonly termed "dead pipe." Life for the head of the metropolitan police is just one double or dashed thing after another. Mr. Rhinelander Waldo, the new commissioner, had no sooner sat down in the seat just vacated by Commissioner James C. Corsey than the customary heckling of pulpit, press and public was resumed. Three men have served their little time as police chief of New York in the last year and in the last decade the repriment has had eight heads. There are probably more men who know how to run the New York police department than there are individuals who feel themselves competent to conduct a newspaper. Count Togo in London.

London, June 6.—A notable delegation from Japan, headed by Prince and Princess Higashi Fushimi of the royal family of Nippon, arrived in London today to take part in the coronation ceremonies. Among the Japanese representatives is Count Togo, the victor of the Sea of Japan and the national hero of his country. Admiral Togo has retired from active service in the navy, but he remains a pre-eminent figure in Japanese affairs. General Count Nogi, who commanded the attack on Port Arthur, is another member of the party.

NEWS OF THE NORTHWEST

Strawberries Go East.

Hood River, Or.—Strawberries are beginning to ripen very rapidly under the present weather conditions. Three cars were shipped last night to eastern points and several car loads will go forward today. It is expected that about 75 car loads will be shipped from the Hood River valley this year.

Surveyors Start from Burns.

Burns, Or.—Three crews of government surveyors, each containing 14 men, arrived in Burns this week and are on their way to the different parts of the county, where unsurveyed land is situated, to proceed with the work of subdivision which they began last year.

Elgin Crops and Fruit Heavy.

Elgin, Or.—Rains of the last two weeks assure record crops in this part of the county. Timothy and alfalfa are in fine condition and the grain crops are promising. Fall wheat is so rank in growth that it will be necessary to mow a crop of hay from it that it may be able to hold its burden of grain. Several farmers have already cut their wheat down and many will follow suit. Full crops of

apples, pears, cherries and small fruits seem certain.

Indian Canoe Given Society.

The Dalles, Or.—B. A. Gifford, photographer, of Portland, formerly of this city, presented the Old Fort Dalles Historical society with an Indian canoe 30 feet long. The aboriginal boat is a dugout made from a fir log and was procured from Indian fishermen several years ago. The canoe, up to the time Mr. Gifford secured it, had been in use nearly a century, and is still in good condition the wood not being decayed at all.

Blind Hear Mary Garden.

Vancouver, Wash.—Eleven pupils of the state school for the blind attended the concert given by Mary Garden in the Armory in Portland last night. The treat to the pupils was given by the citizens' committee which was appointed recently to lend assistance in making the life of the inmates of the institution more enjoyable.

The pupils were in charge of George Mullin, principal, and Miss Mary Gray, teacher.

K. of P. Plan Gaston Picnic.

Forest Grove, Or.—The Knights of Pythias lodges of this district are planning to hold an elaborate picnic in Washington county, June 24, at Gaston. The program will consist of instrumental and vocal music, speeches by prominent members of the different lodges represented, a

dinner at noon and sports of all kinds, including a ball game. The following lodges will be represented at the picnic: Cornelius, North Plains, Forest Grove, Hillsboro, Newburg, North Yamhill and Gaston.

Berry Demand Heavy.

Freewater, Or.—Over 500 crates of strawberries were shipped away from Milton and Freewater last week. The demand for them is greater than the Milton-Freewater Fruit Growers' Union and the Shields Fruit company can supply. Today the town merchants could not obtain any for the home market, consequently it was a case of "berries, berries everywhere and not a berry to eat." On account of the cool weather of the last few days the price of strawberries has jumped from \$2.50 to \$3.50 a crate. Banks is wondering.

Forest Grove, Or.—The town of Banks, seven miles north of this city, is in something of a dilemma, as the track of the United Railways electric line crosses the track of the P. R. & N. line a half mile from the business center of the town, and it is a question whether the town will gradually build so as to center near the junction of the two railroads, or remain where it is. The steam road will be in full operation some time this year clear to Tillamook, and Banks is on this line, having a depot near the center of town. Banks now has a population of over 250, with a commercial club identified with the Oregon Development league.

Get to the Point Quick!

Truthful Advertising Creates Confidence and Future Business.

No matter how enthusiastic the advertiser gets, he should never claim too much. If he does he may meet the same fate as the candidate for congress whom we once heard about.

"My fellow citizens," he cried, "I have fought against the Indians; I have often had no bed but the battlefield and no canopy but the sky. I have marched over the frozen ground till every step has been marked with blood."

His story told well until a shrewd-looking voter came to the front and asked:

"Did you say you fought for the Union?"

"Yes," replied the candidate.

"And again the Indians?"

"Yes, many a time."

"And you slept on the battlefield with only the sky for a kiver?"

"Certainly."

"And your feet bled while walking on the frozen ground?"

"That's so," cried the axillant candidate.

"Then I'll be blamed if you ain't done enough for your country. Go home and rest. I'll vote for the other fellow."

That hard-headed voter is just like the readers of advertisements. They will surely vote for your competitor if you claim too much.

The average American is fairly well equipped with horse sense, and he recognizes a falsehood even when he sees it on paper.

The advertiser may grow as enthusiastic as he desires, but it behooves him to stick to reason, which is truth.

Tell your story, and tell it well, but don't fabricate. It isn't wise to take too much time to tell it either.

Which reminds me of a story of a minister who was invited to fill another minister's pulpit for one Sunday. On Monday the regular clergyman ventured to ask one of his deacons, "How did you like the sermon?"

"Well," he replied, "the first three hours and a half I liked it pretty well, but after that I began to get discouraged."

The Anglo-Saxon is noted for his tenacity but three hours and a half of sermon is too much, and the same rule applies to advertisements as to sermons.

An advertisement should be as brief and pointed as possible, so that the reader won't get tired out and quit before he is half way through.

An advertisement that isn't read represents just so much wasted space and so much money thrown away.

In the rush and go of modern life, strenuous Americans want their reading matter dished up in short, crisp paragraphs. This is why newspapers have adopted the plan of putting big headlines on their news stories. People who haven't time to read all the paper contains may get a summary of the news in the headlines. Virtually they may "read as they run."

If they can read your advertisements as they run, and those advertisements are composed of the right kind of material, there is no limit to the possibilities of your advertising appropriation.
