TRADE EXCURSION TO AUSTRALIA

COMPLETES ARRANGEMENTS

Spokane, Wash., June 7.—Arrangements have been completed by the Spokane chamber of commerce for a trade excursion to Australia and New Zealand, leaving the Pacific coast in January, 1911, on which the foreign government, the states and territories and commercial organizations throughout the union will be invited to send representatives. The party will be limited to 100.

R. J. Maclean, secretary of the Spokane chamber, announces the purposes of the excursion, which will occupy 35 days, of which 10 days will be spent in visiting the various cities.

To study the municipal governments of the cities.
To study the trade and commerce of the countries visited.
To encourage and develop reciprocal relations between the United States and Australia and New Zealand.

To strengthen the bond of friendship and good will between the people of the United States and the people of the countries visited.

To extend a cordial invitation to the governments of New South Wales, Victoria, South Australia, Queensland, Western Australia and New Zealand to send representatives to study the progress of the United States, to the end that Australasia and the United States may be brought into closer commercial relation.

"We believe this will be one of the most important excursions of its kind yet attempted by any commercial organization in the United States," said Edwin T. Cowan, head of the chamber of commerce, "and we have also every reason to think that it will be attended by representative business men from all over the country."

"The Spokane chamber of commerce has been assured by an official of the government of New South Wales that its invitation to the various governments will be accepted and that we shall have the pleasure of entertaining a large party in return."

 Man Starving Solid Food for Years Regains Appetite.
 Seattle, Wash.—Reading a book on Arctic exploration in which was depicted the great hunger and suffering of the scientists cured H. T. Strom of anorexia, and he is rapidly regaining a normal appetite.

For years Strom had been unable to eat anything but soup and a small quantity of fruit. His body wasted, and he was treated by physicians in vain. Recently he obtained a copy of a book on Arctic exploration in the polar regions and read it with more than usual interest.

The period when the explorers looked in vain for food to satisfy their hunger, the sufferings from cold and exposure, and the dealing out of rationed rations by chance, so revived the poor domestic stomach of Strom that he felt himself recovering. He grew hungry and ate meat for the first time in years.
