Real Baseball Wedding. Two Players, Brothers, Will Lead Sisters to Home Plate. Pittsburg, Pa.—A baseball wedding soon will unite two pretty sisters, baseball fanesses from Penn township, near Pittsburg, to two former amateur ball players, brothers. Invitations have been issued by Mrs. Anna W. McJunkin of Unify for the marriage of her daughters, Miss Alice Stewart McJunkin, to John Nelson Morrow of Wilkinsburg, and Miss Jane McJunkin to Lee Morrow, also of Wilkinsburg. At the Picture Shows. Orpheum. Pendleton's favorite picture theater, Two Vitagraph special feature films for Sunday and Monday.

1. "The Welcome of the Unwelcome." Vitagraph. This pretty drama has a delightful school girl heroine. The inviolable one is the new stepmother-to-be. Miss Grace Louise takes the part of the school girl, Mr. Johnson has the part of her father, and Julia Swayne is the stepmother. It is a very pleasant, worthy comedy.

2. "The Show Girl." Vitagraph. This is an exceptionally fine picture. A strong story is told in this film and told without the overdoing of tragic scenes. The acting is up to the usual Vitagraph standard.

3. "Lucia's Broken Promise." Pathé. Lucia is an Italian girl who plays the violin on the street to the accompaniment of her father's harp. The Pastime. The house of quality. Extra good program for Sunday and Monday.

"Back to the Primitive." Selig. A picture which has qualities that makes it in some respects the most remarkable picture yet produced. The first scene shows us that a man who lives in Africa is sending to England for his sister Helen. In the next scene we see Helen and her escort en-route on the ship. At Suez an American comes aboard. We then see a wrecked ship. Helen, her English escort and the American escape on a raft, and reach the beach. Then we see the stockade they have built for protection from beasts. It is night; five or six leopards are seen prowling about in the forest. Helen's brother has hopes she has been saved from

the wreck and prepares to find her. The next scene shows the party of Helen's brother arriving at the signal flag on the beach, placed there by the American to attract passing ships. Again the picture shows us Helen and the American alone. The girl has refused to save herself. The lions are coming through the trees. One of them leaves the cover and charges straight for the man and woman. It is a real charge. It is about to reach its prey when the party of Helen's brother arrives, and the lion falls dead, and the audience relieves its pent up feelings in a sign of relief. "Drifting." Lubin. Love drew two hearts together after years of separation. This is as pretty a love story as has been seen on the screen.

"Three of a Kind." Baumont. Here is a drama representing the adventures of a young man who is apparently equally beloved of three girls. Only when he is charged of a crime does the sterling character of the love of one of them display itself. The play is pleasant, the actors perform their parts well.

"Spring Heeled Jack." This is a trick picture.

The Cosy. Three great Western stories for Friday and Saturday.

"Maze of Fate." Imp. A story of the West with a strong plot and full of heart interest. A young lawyer sets about to prove the innocence of an old drunkard and succeeds in an original way. He wins the love of the daughter but he meets death in a highly dramatic manner. The sensational plunge over the falls by the victim of the wrath of villains is one of the most thrilling pictures ever thrown on the screen.

"Vindicated." Thanhouser. The story of a convict who proved his honesty very unexpectedly and thereby won the love of a minister's daughter. But he was continually hounded by his past record and they went to a place where he and his past were unknown, where they began a happier life.

"She Wanted a Man With Brains." Champion. A Western comedy drama. A cowboy fell madly in love with the new school ma'am and after saving her from a runaway horse he proposed but was coldly rejected as "she wanted a man with brains." Angered by his harsh treatment the cowboy left the ranch and studied law, became a great lawyer and later met the teacher who was anxious to marry him, but it was his time to do the frigid act. A breezy story of Western life.

"A Gamble With Love." Powers. A Nevada love story with the dash of the West. The woman's first love reappeared at a critical moment, but she decides to stay with her husband and child. The scene where the husband appears while the former lover is pleading with the wife to go away is unusually dramatic. A story of great interest.
