Thousands of persons were lined up to watch him as his car sped from Paddington station to Alexandria Mansions, where he had engaged quarters. They cheered vociferously.

Attired in a dressing gown which would have made the famous habitments of Joseph turn to a pale envious green, Jack last night held an impromptu reception in the gorgeous 11 room furnished flat which he engaged by cable a week ago. The cable ordered the swiftest flat in London and Jack, amid a riot of color that matched his gown, was contented.

His visit caused a sensation and the hit of the coronation assemblage. Special police guards were necessary to force a way through his admirers as he motored with his wife to the Alexandria mansion.

The crowds went wild over the big cinder, cheered him lustily whenever he appeared on the streets. No visiting king of all the host of royalty expected here during the next few days can expect a welcome half so hearty.
