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WILL BUSINESS MEN SHARE IN NEW RATES?

**POWER & LIGHT CO.
REDUCE RATES ELSEWHERE**

Reduction Is to Be at Walla Walla—Committee from Local Commercial Club Will Investigate Situation.

Local business men are now asking if Pendleton is to share in the rate reductions granted by the Pacific Power & Light company at Walla Walla and Yakima and a commercial club committee is to investigate. A reduction in the rates on meters has been granted at Yakima as a result of agitation for a municipal light plant.

The following story of the reductions to be made at Walla Walla is from a Walla Walla paper:

When the Walla Walla patrons of the Pacific Power & Light company present themselves at the company's local offices for the purpose of settling their bills the first of the coming month they will find their accounts made out under the new rates recently announced by the company, which means a saving of nearly 25 per cent to both resident and commercial customers.

Not only does the new rate provide for a big reduction in the rate for each kilowatt hour, but it further provides for a 10 per cent discount on all bills paid on or before the 10th day of the month following the month in which the bill was rendered. Under the new rate the residential meter rate with connected lighting load of one kilowatt or less, first 30 kilowatt hours, is 12 cents per kilowatt hour and all in excess of 30 kilowatt hours per month, eight cents per kilowatt hour.

The actual reduction, however, can be better shown by illustration. For example:

A residence, where the lighting bill is \$5.70 a month on the old rate, is figured as follows:
First 20 kilowatt hours or less, at 15 cents per kilowatt hour, \$3; next 20 to 30 kilowatt hours, at 14 cents per kilowatt hour, \$1.40; next 20 to 40 kilowatt hours at 13 cents, \$1.30; total \$5.70; less 2 per cent discount if paid on or before the 10th of the month, \$5.58.

Under the new rate the bill will be figured thusly: First 30 kilowatt hours per month, at 12 cents, \$3.60; next 10 kilowatt hours per month, at 8 cents, \$0.80, \$4.40; deducting 10 per cent discount if paid on or before the tenth of the month, the bill would be \$3.96, or a reduction of over 25 per cent.

Figuring on the same basis where the residence bill runs \$2.55 a month with 2 per cent discount for prompt payment of bill, would amount to \$2.50, but under the new rate, with the same kilowatt hour consumption per month, the bill would amount to \$2.04 and with the 10 per cent discount, would be reduced to \$1.85.

In other words, one can have 25 per cent more light without increasing his light bills.
