TIMBER LAND TO BE CLEARED AND SETTLED

SMALL FARMERS TO OCCUPY CUT-OVER LANDS

One Million Acres to be Settled in Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana—Will be Sold at Lowest Price to Actual Settlers.

Spokane, Wash.—More than 1,000,000 acres of cut-over timber lands in eastern Washington and Oregon, north and central Idaho and western Montana will be cleared and settled by small farmers and homebuilders during the next few years, with the carrying out of the plan practically agreed upon by prominent lumber manufacturers and commercial clubs of the Inland Empire.

Every precaution will be taken to keep the lands from falling into the hands of speculators, the purpose being to sell it at the lowest price to actual settlers, who will develop their holdings and thus add to the wealth production of the nation.

E. F. Cartier Van Dessel, president of the Phoenix Lumber company of Spokane, who first brought the plan of developing the vast acreages of logged-off lands in this territory to the attention of the Spokane Chamber of Commerce, has been successful in interesting many bodies of trade and similar organizations in the movement. Joined with these forces are the transcontinental railroads and timber concerns throughout the northwest.

Development agents in the employ of the railroads also have thoroughly investigated the possibilities of the lands in the districts, and their report bears out the statement that soil, climate and market conditions are nearly ideal for fruit, grain, hay, dairying and hog and poultry growing.

"While there are localities where 20 acres of land will provide for a family," Mr. Van Dessel said, in discussing the proposal to utilize the lands to the best interests of the various communities, "probably the bulk of it will be cut up into 40, 80 and 160-acre farms. It has been demonstrated that the 'clear-gliding' system is the most practical to clear the land of stumps."

MARVELS OF BIRD FLIGHT.

ulture Glide for Miles Without a single Wing Beat.

On the horizon in tropical countries there often appears a small black point visible only to the practiced eye. The point increases in size as it approaches. It is the sailing bird par excellence, the vulture, returning to its hollow in the rock a dozen miles away.

A glider, who sails magnificently upon its outstretched wings, without a beat, without the slightest deviation from its perfectly straight track,

it thus traverses the space from one horizon to the other, again becomes an imperceptible point and disappears leaving the spectator marveling at the simplicity with which nature solves a problem of mechanics, which appeared impossible to man.

When one observes a sea eagle perched upon a lofty cliff it may be remarked that in order to quit its eyrie it waits until a gust of wind arises, then it lets itself fall forward with extended wings, giving a beat or two as it turns, bringing itself to face the wind and thus mounts without a wing beat hundreds of yards high.

A gliding bird so sets its wings that the air current makes an angle with their plane. The wind thus sustains its weight and gives it at the same time a forward movement. If its force is stronger than is necessary to obtain these two effects it produces a third effect—the bird mounts into space without a wing beat. If the air suddenly becomes calm the bird would fall, but the fall would be astonishingly slow.

Professor Drzewiecki has calculated that a gliding bird, at a height of 1,200 yards, at the moment when it commences to descend with motionless wings, can by setting them at the most favorable angle touch the ground at a horizontal distance of about fifteen miles. If the wind fall, large birds can always, with a few wing beats, attain an altitude where they will find a wind which will permit them to continue their journey "on the glide."

The gusts and eddies of the wind are, of course, great disturbers of flights, and few birds attempt to struggle with a tempest. Even the strongest flyers have not from this point of view so much boldness as they generally get credit for. Thus the stormy petrel is so named, not because it braves the storm but because as soon as a storm threatens it will often seek for refuge on a ship's rigging and thus foretell the tempest. And if the albatross loves the stormy waves it is only because it frequently alights upon the water, where it often sleeps securely to the rocking of the billows.—Dundon Strand.

Obstinacy of Would-be Bride Balks an Elopement.

Sacramento, Cal.—Because the intended bride steadfastly refused to give her correct age, an elopement from Chico to this city was a failure. Miss Viola Crum, who says she is over 21 and whose word on that point is doubted, was the obstinate young woman. She is a graduate of the Chico State Normal school and has been teaching school at Stirling City the past two years. Harold Payke of Stirling City is the young man who won her heart. Miss Crum's mother raised violent objections to her daughter's proposed marriage, so the two slipped away to Sacramento. At the county clerk's office they applied for a license and Payke gave all necessary details regarding himself, saying that he is 27 years old. When Clerk Pfund asked Miss Crum her age she replied demurely "Over 21." Pfund insisted on her exact age and she declared it was unnecessary for him to be so exacting, that clerks in other counties were not so horrid and that he was just too mean for anything.

Pfund was obstinate. Four times the couple returned to argue with the county clerk before he closed his office. Then they left with the declaration that they would give their marriage business to some other county.

OREGON EXHIBITS AT OMAHA LAND SHOW

INLAND EMPIRE CROPS ARE VERY PROMISING

Promise of good crops in the Inland Empire was never brighter according to J. G. Woodworth, traffic manager of the Northern Pacific railway, who has just arrived in Portland from a trip through eastern Washington and Northern Idaho, says the Portland Oregonian. While greatly pleased with this condition, Mr. Woodworth expresses regret that the area of cultivated lands is not increasing more rapidly.

"New territory has been and will be opened up by railroad building and cheap lands will attract settlers, but the quickest way to increase the wealth and business of these Western states is to get better use of the land already under cultivation," said Mr. Woodworth last night.

"We have just made a trip through eastern Washington and Northern Idaho. There was never such a good prospect for grain crops in the Big Bend, Palouse and Camas Prairie districts, but there is no great increase in the land under cultivation, very little if any increase in livestock and dairying and in the oldest and best districts where land is most valuable the resident farmers are fewer than they were 10 years ago.

"Our business in the Palouse and Walla Walla countries would soon double if there was a family on every quarter-section, or, better yet, on every 80 acres, and they would do well if they raised everything possible but with the increasing tendency to large individual land holdings and exclusive grain crops the annual production and wealth of the country is not increasing. There is very little more shipped out of the Palouse and Walla Walla districts than 10 years ago. The actual figures would doubtless show less in many localities. The agricultural colleges are doing good work and we are helping with demonstration trains and otherwise but results are disappointing."

NAVY TO BE INCREASED.

Recruiting Offices Will be Opened in Northwest.

Bremerton, Wash.—Announcement was made here yesterday of a plan of the navy department to establish a system of partly recruiting offices at Seattle, Portland, Walla Walla, Spokane and Boise, Idaho, in accordance with the purpose of bringing the enlisted force above the authorized enlisted strength of the navy.

The actual number of men in the navy at present is about 600 below the full fighting strength. The falling off is due to the fact that many men who joined the navy in 1907 to take part in the world cruise of the battleship fleet have served their four years and are returning to civilian life.
