WHITE SAYS SWAT THE FLY.

on the Fly will give an idea of Dr. White's treatment of his subject:

A Catechism.

1. Where is the fly born? In manure and filth.

2. Where does the fly live? In every kind of filth.

3. Is anything too filthy for the fly to eat? No.

4. (a) Where does he go when he leaves the vault and the manure pile and the spittoon into the kitchen and dining room. (b) What does he do there. He walks on the bread, fruit and vegetables; he wipes his feet on the butter and bathes in the buttermilk.

5. Does the fly visit the patient sick with consumption, typhoid fever and cholera infantum? He does—and may call on you next.

6. Is the fly dangerous? He is man's worst pest and more dangerous than wild beasts or rattlesnakes.

7. What disease does the fly carry? He carries typhoid fever, tuberculosis and summer complaint. What is his correct name? Typhoid fly.

Doing Valuable Work.
Introducing the speaker of the evening, Dr. C. J. Smith, who is a member of the state board of health, spoke in a general way of the work now be-

ing done by the board of whom Dr. White is the administrative officer. He told of the conditions existing some years ago before the state board of health was organized and of the difficulty the physicians of this county had in handling a smallpox epidemic in the late nineties before the state board was organized.

MRS. B. A. MARQUIS DEAD AT ADAMS HOME
