**CONCRETE PAVING DOES NOT GIVE SATISFACTION**

Kent is Searching About for a Substitute for What They Now Have.

Special correspondence from Kent, in the Tacoma Ledger, reveals a deplorable condition in the matter of street pavements in the first mentioned city.

Only a few months ago, by order of the city council of Kent, a number of blocks of concrete pavement were laid. The snow and ice and traffic of a single winter have caused them to deteriorate. Today they are in a very unsatisfactory condition.

The citizens of Kent are searching about for some relief through the adoption of a more enduring character of street pavement.

The extract referred to above from the Tacoma Ledger is as follows: "The members of the Kent city council were in this city during the past week looking over the bitulithic street paving laid here during the past year. They were enthusiastic over the condition of the paved streets of Puyallup, and invited Superintendent S. K. Fitzhugh of the Warren Construction company, to bid on covering the cement paving now in use in their city with the bitulithic as used here. They say that the cement paving is unsatisfactory."
