SHORT LINE PAYS HIGH PRICE FOR LAND

Idaho Falls, June 21.—There is much speculation in this part of the state in regard to the probable use of the Oregon Short Line Railroad company will put to the recent tract of state lands bought by a representative of that company at the recent sale of state lands held at St. Anthony, the county seat of Fremont county.

The price paid, \$120 per acre, breaks all the records of the land office for the sale of land of this character which is practically unfit for agricultural use. The land is situated on the Idaho Falls-Yellowstone railroad, nine miles northwest of Island Park and adjoining the famous Railroad ranch, the property of General Manager Bancroft of the Oregon Short Line. The railroad ranch is a famous hunting and fishing resort patronized very largely by the eastern friends of the officials of Oregon Short Line and where it is said that Mrs. E. H. Hariman has signi-

fied her intention of spending this summer.

The tract sold is in the heart of the most picturesque and rugged sections of Fremont county, deep in the mountains and accessible only by means of a not too well defined trail. The tract proper is watered by the most famous trout streams of the state and is within a few miles of the famous big game country of Jackson Hole, Wyo., and within a few miles of the border of the Yellowstone national park. The tract is heavily timbered and has always been considered an ideal camping, hunting and fishing spot by those familiar with the best locations for this sport.

Some people are of the opinion that the property has been bought for one of the large eastern clubs which will use the place as a club grounds and hunting and fishing reserve, while others are of the opinion that a big sanitarium is to be located there in the center of the great pine forests. The high price paid for land considered worthless, causes the feeling that some one or company of means expects to make permanent and extensive improvements.

TELLS PORTLAND OF PENDLETON ROUND-UP

CARL POWER COMPLETES TRIP TO ROSE CITY

Local Harness Man Rides Horseback to The Dalles and Then Ships Saddle Horse Remainder of Journey.

Riding across the plains of Umatilla county, then into the sheep section of Morrow, through the wheat fields of Gilliam, into the hills of Sherman and on to Wasco, A. C. Power, representative for the Pendleton Round-Up, reached Portland last evening, having shipped his tough little saddle horse from The Dalles, says the Portland Journal. He made the trip from Pendleton in less than a week.

"It's going to be some Round-up this year," said Mr. Power. "Folks say we have the finest grandstand in the west and the new park is a hum-dinger. The grandstand and bleachers will seat 15,000 people, and if necessary we can soon build more seats. We have a fine quarter mile race track and a dandy half mile pleasure drive. And to keep it in good condition, we have organized a driving club that is working overtime."

"Doc" Great Horse.

Mr. Power made the ride from Pendleton on "Doc," winner of the half mile race at the Round-up last year, winner of the northwest pony express race and third in the relay.

"Doc" is sure some horse," said Mr. Power. "You've got to hand it to 'Doc.' Any time they get away from 'Doc,' believe me, they got to go some."

The Round-up this year promises to eclipse last year's performance by a hundred per cent, thinks Mr. Power. The wildest meanest bronchos from over the United States will be there as will the riders for them. From Colorado, Wyoming, Utah, Montana, Washington—everywhere where there are bronchos and riders. The hills of northern Arizona will be made to give up their untamed, unbranded steeds; the Hole-in-the-Wall country of Wyoming will be scouted for buckers and the eastern Oregon mankillers will be rounded up for the fray.

\$350 Saddle Prize.

The first prize for the winner of the bucking broncho contest will be a \$350 saddle, said to be one of the finest hand carved saddles ever turned out. It is now being made by E. L. Power & Son of Pendleton, and it will be exhibited at the Seattle Potlatch, afterward at Portland and at the Cheyenne Frontier show, which will be held the latter part of August. It will no doubt attract a great number of outside riders.

Besides the bad horses that took part in the contest last year—Dynamite, Lightfoot, Blue Blazes and the Nelson horse—there will be other bad ones from other states, including Teddy Roosevelt, Jr., said to be the worst horse in Wyoming. Teddy Roosevelt, Jr., is a new find and he is said to be 13 times more than Steamboat who could buck more ways than was ever dreamed of. Steamboat has lost many of his laurels for many cowpunchers have successfully negotiated Teddy. Then there will be a number of other horses yet unnamed—the owners can't think of names that sound vicious enough.

Woman Rider's Challenge.

Mrs. Dell Blanchett, Wyoming's famous woman rider, will be at the Round-up with a challenge to any woman rider in the world to ride a bucking broncho without pulling leather. She rides 'em all alike and it is said that few men can stick to the saddle in emergencies as well as she.

Buffalo Bill has promised to be present at the Round-up this year, as has Buffalo Vernon, the famous bulldozer. Other noted bull doggers will also be present. Bull dogging consists of catching a wild Texas steer by the horns and throwing him and holding him on the ground—a dangerous pastime accent on the dangerous.

The date for the 1911 Round-up has been fixed for September 14, 15 and 16. Last year about 10,000 people saw the contests; this year preparations are being made to entertain 20,000 and it is fully expected that many will attend.

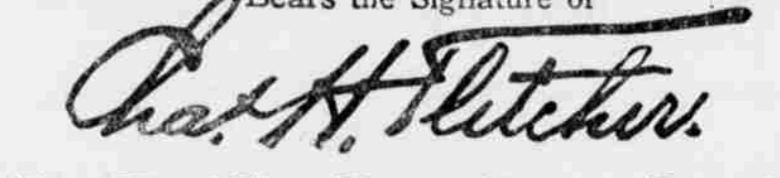
