### KIDNAPED WIFE ASKS COURT FOR DIVORCE

Hillsboro Or., June 22.—As a sequel to the alleged kidnaping last Saturday night of 17-year-old Vida Lewis by James Wilson, to whom she was married more than a month ago but with whom she had never lived, Wilson is in the county jail at Hillsboro and the young wife has filed a suit for divorce. The couple were found by Officer McQuillan Sunday night in a wood chopper's cabin near Groveland. The girl was returned to her parents and Wilson locked up in default of bail.

In the divorce complaint Mrs. Wilson sets forth that her marriage on May 8 was void, she being a minor. She charges that Wilson forcibly and against her will abducted her and compelled her to be his wife and that she fears a repetition of the act or that he will do her great bodily harm.

The assault case against Wilson came up yesterday in Justice Smith's court and was postponed for a week. The complaint in this case was made by Gus Lewis, the father, and is based on allegation that as the girl was returning from a theater she was hustled against her will into an automobile by Wilson and taken away.

### GIRL WEARS PANTS SKIRT.

Chicago, Ill.—Fashion routed finance yesterday on the bourse. For the bulls and bears of La Salle street were precipitated bowled over by the appearance of a pantaloons skirted gown of blue linen on Miss Fern Stevenson, 3729 Ward avenue, a seventeen-year-old switch board operator in the Corn Exchange building.

Technically the skirt was fashioned much after the manner of the old-time divided skirts that were popular when the bicycle mania was at its height.

Withal 'twas a modest garment—much more so, thanks to its flaring "skirt" than the epidemic hobble. "I like it," frankly remarked Miss Stevenson. "It is cool and comfortable and I imagine that such a gown, if made of heavy material, would be very warm in winter. I think it is a modest and pretty gown and so does my father, or he would never have permitted me to wear it. Where did I get it? Why, I didn't get it. I made it. It is the first dress I ever made myself. A friend of mine, Henrietta Peak, made one too, but her folks wouldn't let her wear hers till she sewed it up."

Woman Seeks Divorce from Husband Adverse to Water.

Marion, Ohio.—Recently the wife of Jacob Scherber, a farmer, asked for divorce on the ground that he was the meanest man on earth. Today the wife of Charles S. Winch, a farmer sued for divorce. She says her husband, who is 41 years old and in good health, never took a bath during all the years she has lived with him except by wading in a stream when they lived near the Whetstone river.

She further says he objected to her bathing their baby and cursed her when she did. He never changed his clothing, the petition recites. "He put it on and never took it off until it was worn to shreds."

### VALUABLE BOOKS MAY BE HAD THROUGH LOCAL LIBRARY

At the Pendleton public library attention is being called to a branch of the library extension work that promises to be of great value if made use of by the patrons. It is in connection with the use of books from the loan collection of the state library commission at Salem.

Under the rules of the state library board books pertaining to specific subjects such as agriculture, domestic science, municipal government and road building, are held available for use by any citizen upon application

and by the payment of postage charges both ways.

At the local library the librarian has catalogues showing the books listed under the heads of domestic science and agriculture and country life. There are 167 volumes in the domestic science list and a total of 151 volumes in the list on agriculture and country life. All of these books are standard and would be of decided value to any one desiring information upon any feature of either of the two general subjects.

The books from the state's loan collection may be secured through the local library. The following paragraph from the rules of the state board show the conditions under which they may be borrowed.

Single books are loaned for a period of twenty-one days and must be received in the library within that time unless renewal is granted. The time will be extended, upon request, as long as the books are needed for study, unless they are reserved for other borrowers. Groups of books may be loaned for varying periods from one to six months according to the needs of borrowers, special arrangements being made at the time of loan. Unless application is for definite books, it should state whether popular or scientific books are wanted and whether for trained students or beginners in the subject. In sending to the Commission for books it is better for the borrower to give second and third choice, so that something can be supplied if the first choice is loaned. Application should contain full address of the applicant and name of the nearest postoffice and express office; also the endorsement noted above.

Publishers' prices of books are given in this list for the benefit of those who may wish to buy them for their own libraries. The Commission has no books for sale.

### WAR GAME TO BE ENACTED BY BIG FLEET

Washington, June 23.—A war game upon more elaborate and comprehensive scale than ever before will be enacted by the battleship fleet in conjunction with the torpedo divisions and the naval militia squadron this summer, according to present plans of the navy department.

The war game, which will begin about July 20, will be played in Narragansett Bay and at the eastern entrance to Long Island Sound. The vessels of the naval militia, together with the torpedo fleet, will defend the bay and the sound against a simulated attack by the by the Atlantic battleship fleet.

The maneuvering will form a part of the regular summer drill and exercises of the naval militia, which will be held on the north Atlantic coast from July 15 to July 25. The greater part of the naval militia of the North Atlantic states will be on board the former naval vessels Chicago, Machias, Tonopah, Vixen, Isle de Cuba, Rodgers, Alben and Sylvia, while the remainder will be placed on board the battleships. The militia fleet will rendezvous at Gardiner's Bay, L. I., proceeding thence to the defense of the sound after a few days of preliminary exercises. After the war game is over the fleet will return to Gardiner's Bay for additional target practice and drills.

The war game will henceforth be a part of the annual program of the naval militia. The navy department considers this important, as the role of the naval militia in time of war will be that of coast defense.

It is hoped that the scope of the exercises may be increased in the near future by obtaining the cooperation and interest of certain yacht clubs, since it is well known that several such organizations have many motor boats and small steamers which will prove an important military asset in war for the defense of harbors and the coast generally.

A 500 mile race for young birds from Warrensburg, Mo., to Cincinnati a 600 mile flight from Burlington, Kan., to Cincinnati, and a 500 mile race for old birds from Scotland, S. D., to Milwaukee, are among the important events for pigeon fanciers starting tomorrow.

University of Pennsylvania cricket team begins a tour of Canada today at Ottawa. Another game will be played in the Dominion capital tomorrow, and next week the red and blue squad will meet the cricketers of Toronto University, the Toronto Cricket Club and the Hamilton, Ont. Cricket Club.

It is reported that the St. Louis American League club has signed Fred Busch, the crack all-around athlete of Michigan Agricultural College, and that he will join the Browns immediately after the close of school today. Busch is admitted to be the best college ball player in Michigan and shows great promise as a pitcher. Baseball is rapidly gaining in popularity in England and there are now a number of regular teams playing out a three months' schedule. All of the games attract large crowds and the "fans" are quite as enthusiastic as in the United States. A special coronation match, English vs. Americans, will be played tomorrow between picked teams.

Harvard and Yale track men will gather in New York tomorrow for the trip to England, where they will meet the combined Cambridge-Oxford teams in a track meet next month. There isn't much optimism on this side as to the result of the international match, as neither the Blue nor Crimson squad have shown up remarkably strong this year. Maybe that's why the Britishers invited them.
