Deacon Is Grandfather.
Sunday night a child was born to Mr. and Mrs. Richard Nye at the home of A. W. Nye on Water street.

Moran Is Recovering.
M. J. Moran, section foreman at Cayuse who was stabbed during the recent Italian riot, has sufficiently recovered from his injury as to be able to sit up at the St. Anthony's hospital. He was out upon the porch at the hospital yesterday.

Water was charged.
Many of the riders in the wild west parade today and trouble with their mounts while passing the Siebert tailoring shop on Webb street. It was finally discovered that the water in a pool in front of the shop had been accidentally charged with electricity through a wire from a nearby pole.

Injured Man Still Low.
George Mustard of Hermiston, who was injured through falling from a freight car at Stanfield recently is still very low at St. Anthony's hospital and his condition is considered critical. Mustard was working on a warehouse and when hurt was on top of a box car, from which he accidentally stepped off.

Traxler of Detroit Mich. Mr. Kimery is to take his position as day clerk at the Hotel St. George and they will make their home in Pendleton permanently.

Three More to Jail.
Three more guests secured rooms in the city hotel today and if arrivals continue, the accommodations of that institution will be sorely taxed. John Henry was given three days for imbibing too freely, Ed Burke five days on a drunk and disorderly charge and Frank Miley three days for drunkenness. John Silts escaped incarceration by forfeiting his bail of five dollars on a disorderly charge.

Return from Yellowstone.
C. B. Daniels and nephew, J. C. Daniels, returned this morning from a trip through Yellowstone Park and report a splendid outing with the weather ideal. Mr. Daniels says the principal souvenirs which he brought back from the great national reserve are in the form of wells on his body due to the voracious mosquitoes which are among the exhibits in the park of natural wonders.

Has Umatilla County Suit.
G. M. Rice, cashier of the First National bank is wearing a new gray suit which is distinctly a product of Umatilla county and in which he feels a pardonable pride. The cloth was made at the Pendleton Woolen Mills from wool grown by the J. E. Smith Land & Sheep company and is of splendid texture. It was presented to Mr. Rice by the Bishop brothers, managers of the mill, as a token of appreciation for his assistance in establishing the mill here.

Rain Helps and Damages.
Edgar W. Smith, who is farming 2000 acres of wheat land in the Vansycle country, is in the city today and declares the rain last evening was a great blessing to the farmers in his neighborhood as their crops were about a week behind what they should be. However, reports from the reservation are to the effect that the rain did more damage than good as some wheat and considerable barley was beaten down by the liquid pellets.

Prize Saddle Exhibited.
The firm of Hamley & Company has on exhibition in its window the prize saddle which it will award to the winner of the wild mule race to be held at Round-up Park on the Fourth of July as one of the big features of the celebration. The saddle is a handsome one, retelling at \$50, and is made with the patent clinch ring. Seven entries for this race have already signed up and others are expected before the date arrives. Wild West Runaway.
A short but exciting runaway occurred on Alta street this afternoon when one of the bus teams engaged in hauling passengers to the wild west show became frightened and dashed down the street. The rig was near the corner of Main and Alta when one of the horses became frightened by getting one leg over a tug. The team dashed down Alta street at a brisk clip and it was several blocks before the driver could stop the animals by zigzagging them. Two pas-

sengers who were in the bus when the race started were jolted out, striking the street on all fours.

Church Buys Lots.
Deeds have been filed with the county recorder by which the Franciscan Capuchin Order of the Diocese of Baker secures possession of eight lots in Stanfield for the purpose of building a church. The lots were purchased from the City Realty company and Henry Waldo Coe.

Order of Adoption Revoked.
Upon the petition of Viola H. Anders, Judge Phelps yesterday revoked the order of adoption made by the county court some time ago by which the niece of the petitioner, Mary Jane Swash, was made the legal daughter of her uncle and stepfather, William Swash. The girl, who is twelve years of age is said to have an estate valued at \$75,000. The aunt is now petitioning to adopt her.

Sues to Collect Notes.
Frank Brown, administrator of the estate of Hans Peter Herrick, known as Peter Nelson, has commenced suit against A. W. Daubner for the collection of sums due on two promissory notes which it is alleged defendants gave to August Ferrians and which have since come into the possession of plaintiff. The notes are for the sums of \$138 and \$189.40 with interest and \$50 attorney fees. Lowell and Winter, Johnson and Skrable are plaintiffs' attorneys.

Water Case is Appealed.
The case of Frank K. Donnelly and William H. Doughtrey vs Joseph Cunha has been appealed to the supreme court of the state by the plaintiffs from the decree made March 3 giving the defendant the right to divert and use 150 inches of water under a six inch pressure prior to the rights of the plaintiffs. Carey & Kerr, Harrison Allen, R. R. Johnson and Frederik Stewer are attorneys for the appellants. The plaintiffs are familiarly known as the Henrietta Milling company of Echo.

Hoboes Steal Food.
Residents of the east end of the city are complaining of petty thieving on the part of a band of hoboes having a camping ground near the two railroad bridges. There are said to have been close to 40 men in the camp a few days ago and they played havoc with butter, eggs and other edibles that had been left on the kitchen porches in that part of town. T. J. Tweedy is one of those who has suffered from the depredations of the hoboes. Last night some of the crowd boldly robbed the Tweedy refrigerator of some butter, bacon milk and other articles. At the home of Lue Rothrock the pilferers got away with a dressed chicken and other delicacies. That the hoboes camped near the bridges are the guilty parties seems conclusive from the fact that some pans that were stolen from the Rothrock place were found at the camp.

TAFT AND DINEEN MENTIONED IN CASE

**HINES CLAIMED CREDIT
FOR STEVENSON'S ELECTION**
Duluth Lumberman Claims to Have Heard Conversation Over Long Distance Phone.

Washington, June 27.—Testifying before the Lorimer investigation committee, W. A. Cook, a lumberman of Duluth, swore today that Hines, the alleged collector of the \$100,000 slush fund, had declared to him (Cook) that he was responsible for the election of United States Senator Stephenson of Wisconsin. Cook said Hines told him that Lorimer would be the next senator.
In the Grand Pacific hotel just preceding Lorimer's election, Cook said the phone rang and he answered it. The operator said that Governor Dineen was on the wire. Cook transferred the phone to Hines, who said: "Is this Governor Dineen I have just left Taft and Aldrich. They tell me that on no consideration should Hopkins be returned to the senate. Lorimer wants to be elected and I will furnish all the money needed. Don't stop at anything."

New York Music Teachers.
Buffalo, N. Y., June 27.—Music teachers of New York state commenced their annual convention in Buffalo today. An elaborate musical program will be a feature of the meeting, which will continue three days.

COMPANY L MUST FIND NEW CAPTAIN

This is the evening for the semi-annual inspection of company L, and the general public is invited to be present at the armory at 8 o'clock to see the showing made by the Pendleton guardsmen.

For the purpose of holding the semi-annual inspection Captain M. S. Kern came up from Hermiston this morning. Speaking of the company and its prospects, Captain Kern said: "There is no reason why a strong company should not be maintained here right along and it only proper interest is shown the company will be alright. There is also a good chance of securing an armory building for this city."
"But unless the company makes a good showing at the inspection and unless a permanent captain can be secured soon, the company may face disbandment. I am merely serving temporarily as commanding officer and will be glad to be relieved since I am no longer a resident of Pendleton."

"From July 9th until 15th, there will be officers and non-commissioned officers school at the Clackamas rifle range. All officers of the guard, the first sergeants and one duty sergeant from each company are instructed to attend and will be expected to attend unless positively prevented from so doing."
"The annual O. N. G. rifle shoot occurs from July 12 to 15th, and will be held at Clackamas."

OBJECT TO CITY LIFE.

Suburbanites Will Resist Proposed Annexation to Cottage Grove.
Cottage Grove, Or., June 27.—Those persons residing outside of the corporation limits of Cottage Grove who were forcibly brought into the city at the special election of May 1 have concluded to resist annexation in the courts and have created a fund among themselves for the purpose, after having consulted legal talent. They set up the claim that the city of Cottage Grove had no legal right to call an election outside of the corporation, and furthermore, that it had no legal authority for proclaiming the territory annexed without a favorable majority vote of the electors residing within the area proposed to be taken into the city. Since the election last May residents and land owners of the alleged annexed territory have refused to comply with laws and ordinances of the municipality, and will claim the right to pay taxes under the county levy instead of that of the city.
